

TO PROBE DEPORTATION

Governor West Instructs Attorney General To Investigate

According to press reports appearing in the Portland Oregonian and Journal and the Coos Bay Times Gov. West has ordered Attorney General Crawford to investigate the deportation of Dr. B. K. Leach from Bandon and Coos county.

A part of the Governor's statement follows:

"There are three distinct propositions to consider in connection with this case, to-wit: 1—The activities of the I. W. W.'s and their deportation from Marshfield. 2—The publication of certain articles by Dr. Leach and his deportation from Bandon. 3—Mob rule. The acts of the radical element of the I. W. W.'s are indefensible. These men have sworn they are without regard for law and order and should therefore be dealt without gloves. In nearly every instance the trouble they brew is due to the failure of week-kneed officials to place them under arrest, and the courts to give them a good long sentence at hard labor instead of the usual ten days or \$10 fine. If the I. W. W.'s, Edgeworth and Everett, were of this type and by violation of law or interference with legitimate business made themselves obnoxious to the people of Marshfield, they should have been taken in hand and prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. Nothing they did however justified the mob."

"As to Dr. Bailey K. Leach personally he is not deserving of much sympathy. His intemperate articles in "Justice," particularly his attack on George Washington, are, in my opinion, vicious, harmful. Even this, however, would not justify the mob."

FARMERS TO HAVE FLOAT

Crops of Oregon in Best of Shape.

Excellent crops of oats and potatoes are being raised in this state, according to reports collected by people who have lately had occasion to visit some of the agricultural districts. Spring oats are doing

particularly well. Winter oats, that developed fully before the late rain, are reported to be in to a considerable extent.

Wheat is not up to its best, but expectations are that a good yield will be harvested. Corn is doing well, and while late in starting, gives promise of an excellent crop.

Hops are doing well in most sections. The yield in the Marksburg district will be very heavy, while that in the neighborhood of Carus is also promising well. The field to the north of Oregon City is in fair shape, but much of the crop planted has been ruined by high water from the river.—Oregon Manufacturer.

Information to Voters.

All voters who registered and voted in 1912 can vote on all matters before the people to be voted on this year without registering again. Those who registered and did not vote last year and those who have not registered for state and county, will have to register before the official registrar in order to vote this fall, or be sworn in at the polls by the election board.

Captain O. Wiren co-operative observer reports the rainfall for the month of July was .47 of an inch, days rainy and cloudy 11, days clear 20. The rainfall for the corresponding month last year was .17 of an inch making a difference of .30 of an inch more this year.
