CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Cow Question Discussed at Wednesday Night's Meeting Much Street Work.

The Common Council met in regular session Wednesday evening with Mayor Mast in the chair and all present but E. B. Henry who was out of the city.

An ordinance was passed regulating the height of awnings as hung over the sidewalks, when this ordinance becomes a law in 30 days all awnings which overhang any sidewalk in the city will have to be 7 feet from the sidewalk line.

The Standard Oil people submitted an ordinance to secure a right to erect a storage house on a certain lot in Woodland Addition on the water front for the storage of oils etc. but the council wanted to know the means and ways that said Co. proposed to handle and store said oil also the kind of building they proposed to erect the ordinance was laid over for further consideration.

The principal matter of the evening was the cow question, a large number of ladies were present and others who had grievances as to the action of the pound master, the question was, "Can the pound master take up cattle when the same is being herded by one in custody." The matter resolved itself in the opinion of the attorney and council that such facts must be proven that such persons were actually in charge and the persons were competent to take charge of such cattle, the matter will be heard at an adjourned meeting of the council on Wednesday evening August 13th and all persons interested in this matter should be present as these matters will then be settled for all times, the recorder was directed to summon all witnesses in the matter to appear and testify in these cases.

Considerable street improvements are in progress the city clerk will this week be advertising the improvements of Chicago avenue formerly Lower Main street between Atwater and First, and 3rd street east formerly First street between Lower Main and Main street, and Baltimore avenue, formerly Main street proper, also Jackson avenue formerly A street under new specifications the work now will consist of grading and sidewalks are petitioned by the people on that street, likewise 7th street west, also 4th street from the R. E. Buck residence to where said street intersects Ocean Drive, also Ocean Drive to where the same intersects Jackson avenue, June Ave. 1st street East and 1st North in Bandon Heights will also be advertised for improvements formerly Vine street, Lochart street and Parker street, the matter of a sewer system in that vicinity will also be taken up at once, bills to the amount of \$772.56 were ordered paid.

A press dispatch from Marshfield, dated August 1st, says: "The Oregon Power Company has made a 28 per cent reduction in its rates on electricity here to go into effect as soon as the Oregon Railroad commission approves the new schedule. The company recently took over the electric franchises at Coquille and Myrtle Point and intends supplying current from a central plant at Marshfield, to North Bend, Marshfield, Eastside, Coquille, Myrtle Point and other towns in the county. A high power transmission line is now under construction which will be used jointly by the Oregon Power Company and the C. A. Smith Company, the latter transmitting electricity to its logging camps."—Coos Bay News.

PORT ELECTION AUGUST 27

Everyone Who Wants Coquille Valley to Advance will vote for it.

Voters of the Port district of the Port of Bandon should not forget that August 27th is the day for the port election and every man or woman who who is interested in his or her own welfare will certainly get out and vote for the port. This is the most vital question that has ever come before the people of the lower Coquille valley, and if it carries will be the greatest boon that has ever come to this section of the country, and likewise if it is defeated it will be the greatest calamity that has ever befallen.

Farmer, merchant, mill man, shipper, laborer and all will suffer the consequence if the port should be defeated, and we want to reiterate what we have said before that the country will receive a backset that it will not recover from in years, if the port is defeated.

We do not say this to scare anyone, nor because we do not have great faith in the future of the Coquille Valley, but we are simply stating cold facts as they really exist and as people will find out sooner or later if the port is defeated.

The fact is, the only people who are fighting the port are the large interests who do not want to pay the taxes that would be levied upon them, and such others of the smaller tax payers as are having the wool pulled down over their eyes by these large interests.

Every man who owns a dollar's worth of property in the lower Coquille Valley is vitally interested in this port question as it means dollars to him if the port carries, and dollars of loss if it is defeated.

The small tax he would have to pay will be returned to him tenfold in increased value of property and shipping facilities. Then too the great question before us is, do we want to go back while every other harbor on the coast goes ahead?

Coos Bay has a port commission and unless we organize one on the river, Coos Bay will get all the appropriations for this section of Oregon and will go ahead, while the Coquille river harbor will go back and thus greatly deteriorate the value of property here.

This is a matter not to be considered lightly, but it is up to everyone of us to study it carefully and act accordingly.

If the port commission carries, this paper knows of at least one large industry that will employ several hundred men, that will be put in on the river, but if the port is defeated the industry will not come, then too we know of other industries that are likely to come if the port carries but will not if it is defeated. These are matters for your immediate consideration and action. Let everyone who is interested in the welfare of the Coquille Valley get in and boost for the port, and get out and vote for it Wednesday August 27th.
