GAMES ARE PROTESTED

Marshfield and Coquille Continue to Play Baby Act.

Manager R. E. L. Bedillion has received the following letter from President H. G. Kern of the Coos County Base Ball League, which shows the baby acts of Coquille and Marshfield and the inconsistency of President Kern.

The letter follows:
North Bend, Aug. 7, 1913.
Mr. R. E. L. Bedillion, Dear Sir:
Both Marshfield and Coquille have protested the games played at Bandon on August 3rd. Both protests are based on the number of imported player you are using. You do not deny you are using more than three imported players and as per agreement made between the five managers, so therefore I will have to and do this day decide both games against the Bandon team and call Marshfield and Coquille winners, 9 to 0.

Now wouldn't that jar your head off. In the first place President Kern never gave Manager Bedillion a chance to affirm or deny whether he was playing more than three imported men; neither did he ever notify Mr. Bedillion that a protest was being made.

The rules strictly are that when a protest is on any such grounds that it shall be made before the game is played and neither Marshfield or Coquille ever intimated such protest, but went ahead and played the games, and if they had won, of course there would have been nothing said, but Bandon simply made monkeys out of both teams and then they were sore, and had to call on President Kern to win the game for them, and that gentleman, apparently being willing to grab anything possible from Bandon, of course granted their request.

Bandon is the only town in the league that is live enough to support a ball team and we have no more imported players than other teams but the cheap skates in the other towns import a bunch of players and get them jobs at something else and then of course they are not imported.

If Mr. Kern is so anxious to settle all protested games in such a hurry, why has he not decided the Marshfield-Myrtle Point game which has been protested for so long.

The fact is that the whole thing is a farce-comedy. Marshfield Coquille and North Bend are not even poor sports, they never reached the stage of a sport, they are a bunch of babies and whenever they are beaten they begin to cry, and then their good servant the league president takes pity and helps them out.

SCHOOL FUND APPORTIONED

The state treasurer last week apportioned \$360,711.30, which was the accrued interest on the irreducible common school fund to the various counties of state according to the ratio of the school census.

The school census this year for the state total 197,110, which is an increase over last year of 7,695 children between the age of four and twenty. Seven counties in the state show a slight loss in the school census from that reported last year. The others report an even number with last year or show an increase. Crook county shows an increase of 342, Curry reports the same as last year, and Malheur shows an increase of 157.

Coos County Gets \$11,432

Compared with the total of last year's apportionment of the interest of the irreducible school fund among the counties of the state, the total of the apportionment made for this year exceeds it by \$8230.14, the total for this year being \$360,711.30 and that for last year \$352,481.16. With an increase, however, of 7604 in the school population during the year, the total population for the last year being 189,506 and that for this year 197,110, the apportionment for each pupil has been reduced 3 cents, the per capita apportionment last year being \$1.86 and that for this year \$1.83.

The apportionment among the counties as made on August 1 gives Coos county \$11,432.01, the school population being 6,247.
