

THREATEN LIFE OF SHERIFF

Portland Ore., Aug. 9.—Sheriff Ward was the recipient this morning of a letter, with a Seattle date line on the outside but obviously the product of a Portland writer, that told him that he would never live to see his recall petition filed and blackmailing him in the vilest of unprintable language.

While the sheriff has received many communications that have called him about every name on the calendar, this one is the first in which his life is actually threatened.

It is practically impossible to do anything towards apprehending the authors of the villainous missives because no name or date is signed on the inside of the letters. A handful of them were turned over to postoffice inspectors here some time ago, but nothing has been accomplished as yet in tracing them.

An important sale was made a few days ago when Richard Quellen sold the halfway house at Corbin to F. F. Friant, late of Silverbell, Ariz. The sale includes over 137 acres of land, considerable stock, etc. and we understand that the consideration paid was in the neighborhood of \$10,000. The deal was made by Donald MacKintosh, one of Bandon's real estate agents.

No Initiative Measures.

In a decision handed down last week, the Oregon supreme court held that initiative measures can not go on the ballot at the special election in November. The opinion was given in the suit for mandamus brought by Marie D. Equi and Mrs. J. R. Oatman against Ben W. Olcott as secretary of state. The demurrer of the defense to the complaint was sustained. The suit was to compel the secretary of state to put on the special election ballot the measure for a woman's eight hour law. —Coquille Herald.

Another attempt to locate the resting place of the long lost steamer Brother Jonathan in Crescent City harbor has proved a failure. A company of eight men, one of whom was a diver, spent some time there recently, but gave it up and returned to San Francisco. It is doubtful if the large amount of gold and silver which the vessel carried will ever be recovered.

DOUGLAS CO. WILL HELP

Whereas, the Good Roads Association of Coos County, Oregon have recently gone upon record as favoring the bonding of said county for the full amount of its legal indebtedness, for the purpose of improving its highways and especially designating the construction of a hard surface road between the Douglas county line and Sunset Bay on Coos Bay, Oregon, via Bridge, and

Whereas, Said Coos County Good Roads association has been and is the pioneer in favoring and advocating the construction and improvement of such a highway, which would greatly aid in the development of western Douglas and Coos counties and bring about a greater commercial intercourse between these two banner counties of this great commonwealth generally, now therefore.

Be it resolved, by the Good Roads association of Douglas county, at a meeting held in Roseburg, Oregon, on the 25th day of July, 1913, that we heartily appreciate and endorse the activity of the Coos County Good Roads association in this great movement, and do hereby pledge said association our loyal support and hearty co-operation with an endeavor of bringing about the construction and improvement of a permanent highway from Coos county to Roseburg via Camas Valley and Brookway, and thus by an united effort bringing us in close touch with our sister county, and its great natural resources.

He Must Pay Victim.

Los Angeles, July 31.—Instead of sending J. S. McNutt to prison, Judge Wilbur of the Superior Court, suspended a five-year sentence today on condition that he pay \$30 a month to Miss Olive Davis, a young woman injured when McNutt's machine was wrecked. It was proved McNutt was intoxicated while driving his automobile. The payments must be made monthly until she has recovered, and as physicians say Miss Davis' injuries are permanent, McNutt must assume a life contract or go to prison for five years.

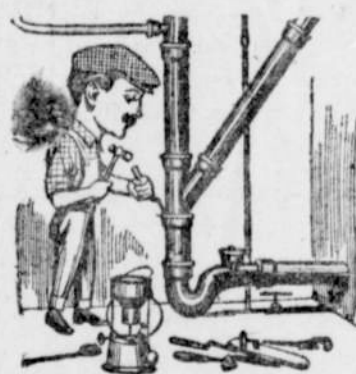
