

**Randon in an Early Day.**

The current issue of the Coos Bay News in its "Early Day Columns, copies from its issue of October 6, 1880, the following, as coming from their Bandon correspondent. It says:

"The survey of our bar and harbor is nearly completed, all being carefully noted and sounded from the outside bar, and along both banks of the river as far as Commodore Point on the North and on the Southern side as far as Bradley's Bay. Mr. Polhemus and his assistants who worked away on Sundays as well as on week days, deserve every credit for the care and assiduity with which they performed this difficult task, and we are convinced that if every employe in the service of the United States earned his money as well as these gentlemen, there would be a considerable sum in addition to what there has been previously at the disposal of the National treasury to pay off the National indebtedness.

We are expecting the announcement of a tri weekly mail on the river and coast in accordance with a numerously signed memorial sent to the Department some time ago, but have received no reply up to the present."

**Leach Has Gone.**

A Roseburg paper says: "Dr. Bailey K. Leach, who arrived here last Thursday from Coos County where he had been a witness before the grand jury investigation of the deportation cases, left this morning for Portland, where he is now publishing his Socialist newspaper, "Justice," which had incited the people of Coos county to such unfriendly treatment of the editor. Dr. Leach will devote himself for the next few weeks to lecturing. He will make his first speech this week at Astoria, and later make a tour of the southern part of the state, appearing in Roseburg in about two weeks. Completing his lectures he will then give his time to developing his paper.

"Leach said investigation of his deportation was probably closed as far as Coos county was concerned. He stated, however, that the facts connected with the affair had been placed in the hands of the government agents and that another investigation would soon be instituted."

for there is abundant evidence that without the executive pressure brought to bear during the last four or five months Democracy in Congress would have done little, if any better than it has done formerly when it attempted tariff revision. President Wilson was moved with the spirit of earnest and honest compliance with the promise to the people who elected Congress on the tariff issue, and demanded honest revision or none at all.

All this is not to say that the present tariff is not without flaws nor at all amenable to criticism. At this time such a tariff is impossible of achievement.

Broadly speaking the new tariff is a reduction of 32 per cent from the import tax imposed by the Payne-Aldrich bill with a free list includes sugar, wool, livestock and other agricultural products and raw material. This means a loss of many millions of revenue to the government, which is balanced by the income tax levied or to be levied or to be levied on incomes of \$3000 a year and up, with an increasing tax on the "up." The provision which removes the appointment of those who will collect that tax from the field of civil service is to be commended; the provision which excludes the importation of goods manufactured chiefly by child labor is likewise to be commended. And the further provision which contemplates the creation of a commission as an advisory board in the revision of tariff laws, is one that is bound to meet with the business approval of the country.

Practically it will be three years before the voters of the country will in effect be able to say whether they approve this law as a whole and would go further in the same direction or not. By that time the new law will have had the opportunity for its own justification. The people generally believe that revision downward will benefit the country. They believe that so strongly that they have turned the men who did not believe it and would not accede to it out of power. They elected others to do their bidding in this matter of tariff, and that has been done so far as existing circumstances will permit—not perfectly done, perhaps, but accomplished with manifest honesty and sincerity. It may be said, too, that the country generally awaits the test of the new tariff in a spirit of optimism.—Telegram.

**Governor West to Get His Money Back.**
