Big Coal Deals.

Thirty thousand tons of Coos county coal will find a market in British Columbia during the ensuing six months, contracts for that amount having been made with Vancouver and Prince Rupert parties by the Coos County Collieries Company. The first cargo left the bunker of the Riverton Coal & Development company, whose mine is at Riverton, on the Coquille river, on Tuesday, when 800 tons consigned to Vancouver were shipped. During the week a second shipment was made from the Libby mine. The company has contracted for the entire output of the Libby and Riverton mines, and also the surplus production of the Smith mine on Coos bay. Besides the contracts mentioned the company is shipping to Seattle and other Puget Sound points and to California.

A representative of the company was in Coquille on Saturday and to The Sentinel said arrangements had been made for two vessels to ply in this trade during the period of the British Columbia contracts, and it is expected that hereafter at least 1000 tons will be taken over the bar each trip.

The Riverton Coal & Development company is increasing its working force, and will by November 1st have a double shift employed, each producing seventy-five tons of coal per day. The company had about 600 tons of coal in the bunkers Saturday night, and rushed work considerably in order to fill out the first cargo forwarded. The mine is in splendid physical condition, the machinery being first-class in every particular.—Sentinel.

Underwood for Senate.

Washington, Oct. 4.—Representative Oscar W. Underwood, majority leader of the House, issued a formal statement announcing his candidacy for the United States Senate today, to succeed the late Joseph F. Johnston, of Alabama. He will enter the Democratic primaries in Alabama next spring with several other prominent Alabama Democrats, including Representatives Henry D. Clayton and Richmond Pearson Hobson.

It is understood also that James Thomas Heflin may be a candidate. "With the enactment of the tariff" said Underwood today, "I have completed the work in the House that it has been my ambition to accomplish. Before retiring from public life, I should like to have the honor of representing the people of Alabama in the Senate."

Representative Clayton was appointed by Governor O'Neal to fill out Senator Johnston's unexpired term but his credentials never have been passed on by the Senate and for weeks it was practically certain that they would not be accepted.
