

NEW YORK POL- ITICIAN DEAD

Former Lieutenant-Governor
of New York was Stricken
During Campaign Speech

New York, Oct. 13.—Timothy L. Woodruff, who was stricken with apoplexy while addressing a fusion meeting two weeks ago, died last night. Woodruff, whose rise as a politician was meteoric, was 55 years old. He served three terms as Lieutenant Governor of the state and attended state and National conventions as a delegate.

Woodruff was born in New Haven and came to New York with nothing but a letter of introduction to the Worcester Salt Company. He became bookkeeper for that concern, and after suggesting the renting of extra warehouses for a customs business he was taken into the firm when the venture turned out a great success.

He was later made head of a patent medicine concern which grew quite prosperous.

He had been active in politics from 1885. In 1895 he was appointed Park Commissioner of Brooklyn, and made his administration popular by throwing open the parks at night for the poor. He had homes in Brooklyn and Garden City, kept apartments in the Ritz Carlton in Manhattan, and his Kill-kare-kamp of 1000 acres in the Adirondacks was one of the finest estates there.

He was twice married. His first wife was Miss Cora Eastman, of Poughkeepsie, by whom he had a son, John, born in 1882. She died in 1900. In 1905 he married Miss Isabel Morrison, who survives him.

He was an active political figure for nearly 30 years, and until a year ago, when he left that party and joined the Progressives, his name was nearly always to be found in roll of Republican National, state and city conventions. He nominated James S. Sherman for Vice-President.

The Graves Case.

Attorney C. R. Peck, who has been designated by the supreme court as referee to hear the disbarment proceedings in the case of Robert O. Graves, has received his appointment and instructions, and as soon as possible, will take the hearing up and proceed under the instructions. Mr. Peck is ordered to give all parties due notice, including Mr. Graves' attorneys, J. W. Bennett, Charles F. McKnight and A. J. Sherwood. Mr. McLaughlin, the man who made the affidavit, and Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist, who in the absence of attorney for McLaughlin, is appointed to represent the state. Mr. Peck's business is to hear the evidence and rule what shall be admitted. There will be a stenographic report of the whole proceedings, and this will be taken by Ira Riddle, court reporter for this district. Mr. Graves and his attorneys are urging a hearing immediately, or at least as soon as the matter can be brought to an issue. However, Mr. McLaughlin is entitled to a ten days' notice and this will probably elapse before the proceedings are started.—The Record.

American Balloon Won.

Paris, Oct. 15.—The Goodyear balloon, the American entry, was declared the winner in the race for the Bennett cup. The Frankfurt, the German entry, landed near Point Ormon, France. All the entries have been accounted for. The Goodyear landed in England and covered 400 miles.

LA FRANCE IS NOW ON TRIAL

Alleged Insurance Swindler
Who was Arrested at Co-
quille Tried in Portland.

Portland, Or., Oct. 17.—The trial of James C. La France on the charge of having defrauded the Modern Woodmen of America out of \$3000 life insurance by having falsely represented that he was dead and having passed off as the body of himself a body of an unknown person found on the shore of the Clackamas river near Estacada is now on.

The trial was suspended with Deputy District Attorney McGuire on the witness stand testifying to an alleged confession of a conspiracy to defraud, made by La France after his arrest.

A sensational feature of this evidence was the testimony of Louis Norman, who was one of a party of four fishermen who found the body on the Clackamas river.

Norman testified that his party was directed to the body by a man whom he afterwards identified as bearing a close resemblance to La France, and that he was convinced that the man was La France.

A gruesome exhibit introduced by the state was the skull and shirt of the dead man which was brought into the court room by A. R. Hawkins, sexton of the Escada cemetery, in a cheese-cloth bag.

In its evidence the state covered the finding of the body and the collection of \$15,000 insurance money by Mrs. La France on the life of her husband.

Since his arrest it is alleged that La France has told several stories relative to the identity of the body passed off as his, but all efforts of the district attorney's office to confirm them have been fruitless.

Evidence has been introduced to the effect that one rib of the corpse was fractured. A hole was also found in the shirt. A foul play theory may be developed from these circumstances in an attempt to determine the identity of the body.

Mrs. La France, who is under indictment, will be tried separately.

Fire at Cedar Point.

A fire at Smith-Powers' hoisting works at the Cedar Point boom last Saturday destroyed the building and damaged the machinery, causing considerable loss and putting a temporary stop to the loading of logs at that point. A new building will be erected at once and the machinery put in shape for the early resumption of activity.—Coquille Herald.

Special Notice to Sportsman.

Owing to the federal law governing migratory birds the following changes in the Oregon game laws are necessary.

Open season for ducks and geese, October 1st to January 15th following inclusive. Bag limit 30 of such birds in any seven consecutive days.

Snipe, rails, and shore birds, October 1st to December 15th inclusive. Bag limit, 30 of such birds in any seven consecutive days.

Shooting is allowed only between sunrise and sunset.
