**Eight-Hour Law May Be Taken Into Court**

Salem, Ore., Oct. 22.—Whether or not the eight-hour law is applicable to laborers employed at the state institutions is the question which is puzzling members of the State Board of Control, and which it will be called upon to decide when it holds its next meeting.

Contending that the measure applies to all persons who perform manual labor, whether they are employed directly by the state or by contract, the Labor Commissioner a week or more ago asked the board to comply with the law. The board asked for time in which to examine the law, and make an investigation as to how much of an observance of it would increase the maintenance cost of the state institutions, and with these now completed, the board will hold a meeting when State Treasurer Kay returns from Southern Oregon.

The members of the board seem to take issue with the commissioner in the construction of the law, and everything would now seem to indicate that they will not comply with his request. They contend that it was only intended to apply to labor employed by contract, and that where the state directly employs labor, no matter what its class, the law does not apply. The Labor Commissioner says that he has carefully examined the law and is satisfied his position is correct, and it is barely possible that he and the members will carry the controversy to the

courts for adjudication. According to the superintendents of the various institutions the observance of the law would so increase their maintenance cost that all at the end of the biennial period would find themselves confronted with large deficiencies.

**Myrtle Point Items.**

Mrs. Mary Dietz, widow of Chas. E. G. Dietz, died at her home in this city Tuesday evening October 21st, 1913 at 9 o'clock after an illness of three weeks. Mrs. Dietz was 66 years, 5 months and 21 days old at the time of her death. Mary Ellen Wilbur was born in Boston, Mass., April 30, 1847, came to California with her parents at the age of five years. She was married to Chas. E. Dietz in Sacramento county, Calif., March 30th, 1868. They moved to Coos county, Oregon, in July of the same year, and resided on the lower Coquille river until the year 1882, when they moved to Myrtle Point where she has since resided. To this union eight children were born all of whom survive, except an infant Jane E. who died August 15, 1881.

The living are Joseph E. of Sacramento county, Calif., Mrs. Chas. Dodge of Oakland, Cal., Mrs. Lewis Sculley of Berkeley, Cal., Mrs. Fred Kirk of Ione, Cal., and William E. Samuel E. and Gustave E. of this city.

The children were all with her at the time of her death. Funeral services were held Thursday, October 23 at 2:00 p. m. at the Latter Day Saints church, the sermon was preached by Elder E. E. Crumly, assisted by Elder A. A. Baker.

**Waste From Desks Goes Into Brushes.**

Waste wood in the manufacture of school desks is now being used for the backs of cheap brushes, according to the statement of the forest service.

A large manufacturer of school desks in Michigan had a considerable amount of waste material in sizes which were too short to enter into the manufacture of the smallest desks, and could not be utilized further with his machinery or in his line of work. This material was all hard maple in pieces an inch thick, a foot or so long, and about three inches wide; for a long time it had been consigned to the waste pile and sold as firewood. This waste amounted to from one thousand to fifteen hundred board feet each day. A nearby manufacturer was using practically this quantity of maple, which he was sawing up into small pieces for making the backs of cheap brushes.

Members of the forest service, investigating methods of eliminating factory waste, conceived the idea that the blocks used by the brush factory could be readily secured from the waste of the school desk manufacturer, and on this basis got the two together. Arrangements were made so that the brush manufacturer now places orders with the other firm for its raw material and what was formerly waste is now a source of profit.

Notice is hereby given: That the Common Council of the City of Bandon, Coos County, Oregon, deems it expedient and necessary to improve FIRST STREET EAST from its intersection with the East line of Alabama Avenue to the Commercial Addition in Bandon easterly to the West line of Fillmore Avenue at the cost and expense of the owners of the lots, parts of lots and tracts of land included in the improvement district No. 17, which district embraces all of the property on either side of said First Street East and abutting thereon between the East line of Alabama Avenue to the West line of Fillmore Avenue from the marginal line of said First Street East back to the center of the block or blocks abutting thereon. Said improvement is to consist substantially of building an elevated roadway (bridge) on the same in accordance with the plans and specifications for said improvement as prepared by the City Engineer, adopted by the Common Council, filed in the office of the City Recorder and there open to the inspection of all persons interested therein, all of said improvements are to be built on the established grade of First Street East. The total cost of said improvements is estimated to be \$10,743.90. Any objections to said improvement (if any exist) must be filed in writing with the City Recorder of Bandon, Oregon, by the owners of TWO-THIRDS in the area of the property within the above assessment district as described on or before November 14, 1913. This notice is given pursuant to a resolution of the Common Council passed upon the 1st day of October, 1913, at a regular meeting thereof.

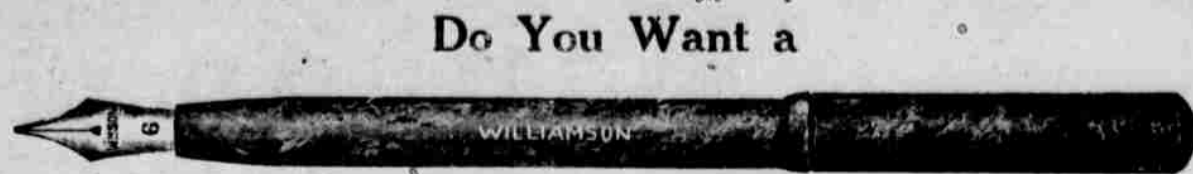
