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THE \$90,000.00 APPROPRIATION.

That is good news which appears on the front page of The Recorder today, concerning the appropriation for the Coquille water way and insures the fact that the harbor will be improved in accordance therewith. It might be stated here that this is the largest single appropriation this river has ever received, \$65,000 being the largest former appropriation.

It is probable that the liberal appropriation is largely due to the forming of a Port Commission and the preparations for a large bonding issue of \$250,000. And in addition the Commission has asked Congress for \$250,000 to be available within the next five years.

The \$90,000 will be available next year and if an equal amount can be secured each year it will help largely toward making the needed improvements on the harbor.

By the way, have you paid your income tax?

Governor West, Democrat, announces that he will support Attorney Geo. Brown of Roseburg, Republican, for attorney general. Times have changed some since '96.

Bandon is growing fast, but is in no respect a boom town. Its future, as gauged by the past of other less favored cities, justifies any expenditure that may be made for municipal improvements.

The Marshfield Record remarks: It may seem strange that there are three different factions in Mexico fighting to put in their several leaders as president. That is nothing. Mexico is not in it with Oregon. Here nearly every county has a candidate for governor and more are coming out every day.

The Salem Capital-Journal advises country newspapers to taboo mention of the weather and cites an instance of an Eastern Oregon editor who came out with a "beautiful flowers in January" story, only to have a three foot snow storm beat it to the subscribers. It is some satisfaction to know that Coos County newspaper men have nothing to fear in this respect.

The Shackelford good roads bill, appropriating \$25,000,000 for the improvement of highways in the U. S. has passed the House of Representatives, and will now go to the Senate where it will undoubtedly receive prompt and favorable attention. The bill provides for the money to be divided \$65,000 to each state, and each state must co-operate to the extent of putting up dollar for dollar with the federal government.

One of the hopeful signs of a return of good business is the fact that the United States is really coming into her own in the merchant marine traffic. The bureau of navigation in a recent report says the United States has in its merchant marine 27,010 vessels with a gross tonnage of 7,885,500 tons. This is the largest tonnage in our history and with the exception of Great Britain, exceeds that of any other two countries combined. While the greater part of this was coast trade, there were 1,027,776 tons carried in our own ships to foreign countries, the largest amount for twenty-seven years. The output of our shipyards was double in 1913 what it was in 1912.—Coos Bay Times.

A change in the present tax law whereby taxes may be paid quarterly is favored by the Linn County Council of the grange. The yearly plan of paying taxes was adopted in the days when store bills were settled but once a year, when the long credit system was in full career, and when wheat was almost the only crop and settlements were impossible oftener than once in a thelvemonth. We put the plan in effect then, and haven't had the public progress yet to realize that it is economically wrong to take from circulation millions of money all at one time and store it up in banks for a whole year's use. Under our heavy taxation we are robbing the channels of trade of so much money by the single annual tax collecting process that it has a bankruptive effect on general business. The Linn County grangers are right. The yearly system is antiquated. It is unbusinesslike. It ought to go where the flint lock went.—Portland Journal.

DUTCH BELTED CATTLE.

Once Nearly Exterminated, They Are Now Bred by the Nobility.

Dutch belted cattle originated in Holland several hundred years ago. At the time of the great Holland war they were nearly exterminated by the invading armies, and the few that remained became the property of the nobility, who have bred them since ever since, but do not willingly part with them. They are known in Holland as Veldrangers, which name means "wrapped around with a sheet."

In color they are black, with a band of pure white entirely around the body. They may also have white fore feet, white hind feet and legs up to the knees and a white switch. The "belt" varies in width. On some it is but a few inches wide. On others it reaches back on the hips and forward on the shoulders. Usually it covers the body from just in front of the hips nearly to the shoulders.

They have the prominent eyes, thin neck, silky hair, soft skin, elevated flanks, broad hips, long slim tails shapely, well placed udders, prominent milk veins and so called milk form, which make up the dairy type of cow. They are very tame and docile, hardy and vigorous.—G. G. Gibbs in American Cultivator.

STOPPING THE EARTH.

It Would Generate Heat Enough to Turn Our Globe to Vapor.

The stopping of a projectile always results in the generation of heat. The velocity and weight of a projectile being known, the amount of heat developed by its stoppage can be calculated. In the case of large bodies moving rapidly the result of the calculation is something astounding.

For example, the earth weighs 6,000,000,000,000 tons and travels in its orbit at the rate of over eighteen miles a second. Should it strike a target strong enough to stop its motion the heat developed by the shock would be sufficient not merely to fuse the earth, but also to reduce a large portion of it to vapor. It has been calculated that the amount of heat generated by a collision so colossal would equal that obtained from the burning of fourteen globes of coal each equal to the earth in size.

And should the earth after its stoppage fall into the sun, as it certainly would do, the amount of heat that would be developed by its impact on the sun would be equal to that generated by the combustion of 5,000 earths of solid carbon.

Two Waterloo.

It is a very curious fact that a good many people do not know that two battles were fought at Waterloo. Both of these were fought against the French, the first under the command of the Duke of Marlborough on Aug. 17, 1705, who on this date actually occupied the same ground as the Duke of Wellington did a little more than a century later, June 17, 1815, the only difference being that the former was marching on Brussels and the latter was marching from Brussels. In the first battle the French were defending Brussels. They marched out to meet Marlborough, but owing to the slackness on the part of Schluengenbourg, the Dutch general, who was fighting with him, it was not a success, Marlborough only taking a few of the French troops as prisoners. The following one, fought against Napoleon by Wellington, proved to be one of the greatest victories ever recorded in the annals of England.
