## THE PORT OF COQUILLE SUED

Myrtle Point Man wants Damages For Alleged Loss Incurred From Brush in a Freshet in East Fork of Coquille Last Fall.

\$4,298.75 IS THE AMOUNT ASKED IN COMPLAINT.

Destroyed 2200 Feet of Boom Which Had Been Constructed At a Cost of \$1996.00 by Myrtle Point Mill Company.

The Coos Bay Times says: The Myrtle Point Mill Company has instituted suit against the Port of Coquille and its president, M. O. Stemler, for \$4298.75 damages, which it claims that the operations of the Port caused it. The case may come up for trial at the April term of court. P. L. Phelan, head of the Myrtle Point Mill Company, was formerly a member of the Port and he alleges that last year the Coquille Port Commission had a gang of men cut a lot of brush along the banks of the East Fork of the Coquille, so that the overhanging growth would not impede navigation. Instead of burning or clearing away the brush, he alleges they allowed it to lie on the banks or fall into the river. Last October, a freshet occurred and this brush, he alleges, was swept down stream and finally formed into a great mass like a moving splash dam. When it reached his booms near Myrtle Point, it carried them out destroying 2200 feet of boom worth \$1996 which he had built under a permit from the War Department. Not only this, but he alleges that he lost \$302.25 worth of logs in the booms that he lost \$1000 by having to close down his mill and suffered other damages making a total of \$4297.75 which he wishes the Port to reimburse him. Peck & Peck have instituted the suit for Phelan and J. D. Goss has been retained to defend the Port.

### HUB CLOTHING STORE AT MYRTLE POINT BURGLARIZED

The store of the Hub Clothing & Shoe Co., on Spruce street was burglarized during the night from Saturday to Sunday, and about \$45 in silver taken. The burglar or burglars entered the rear room through the transom over the door. Entrance to the main room was gained by cutting away, evidently with a brace and bit, the casing where the lock is located. The ends were taken from the hinges and there were marks which show that an attempt was first made to pry the door out of place without cutting away the lock.

On closing the store Saturday night the Fenslers, who manage the store here took the money from the till of the cash register and placed it in one of the drawers under the close rack, and from the fact that nothing else in the store was disturbed it is apparent that whoever turned the trick knew that the money was there and just where to find it.

It is understood that local parties are suspected of the job but thus far nothing directly connecting anyone with the affair has been learned.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

### SCHOOL AT BRIDGE HAS REACHED "A" STANDARD

Coquille, Ore., March 29.—The first school in Coos county to reach the required 96 credits to make it a "standard A" school, under the requirements of a plan recently formulated by County Superintendent Baker, is the school at Bridge, District No. 77, which has an enrollment of 60 pupils. A month ago Superintendent Baker sent out the cards describing the plan for standardization of the schools of Coos county, and when he went up to Bridge he found that No. 77 had a grade of 85. Four days afterwards, when Mr. Baker revisited the school, they had reached the coveted 96 points.

### A FAMOUS SPEECH.

The great Daniel Webster sometimes drank more brandy than was good for him, says Goodwin's Weekly. On such occasions he could stand squarely on his feet and carry on his face a look as profound as all the ages, but he could not long keep his mind concentrated on a subject and language took on an extraordinary range.

About the year 1840 he was invited to make the address at the state fair in Rochester, N. Y., and accepted the invitation. When the hour for speaking arrived he was introduced and spoke in substance as follows:

"Ladies and gentlemen: I hold it a distinguished honor to be invited to address you. It is with extreme pleasure that I mark the many improvements which you have made since my last visit to your beautiful city. Your blocks of stately buildings, the marvelous aqueduct that spans your majestic Genesee river, which I am told has falls one hundred and fifty feet high.

"Ladies and gentlemen, Greece was the cradle in which genius and real art and eloquence was first rocked; she had her Epaminandus, her Demosthenes, her Themistocles, but Greece in all her glory never had a waterfall one hundred and fifty feet high.

"Rome that sat upon her seven hills and from her throne of beauty ruled the world; Rome had her Scipio, her Caesar and her Cicero, but Rome in all her sovereign majesty never had a waterfall one hundred and fifty feet high.

"Great Britain, whose young queen rules an empire beside which imperial Rome at the height of her power held but a second place; Victoria, whose empire is so vast that its morning drum beat, following the sun and keeping company with the hours, circles the world with the music of the martial airs of England, Queen Victoria in all the pride and splendor and power of her realm never had a waterfall one hundred and fifty feet high."

That finished the speech and nearly finished the audience.
