IRELAND'S POPULATION.
There are 4,450,000 people in
Ireland, by the census of 1911, of
whom 3,265,000, or 74 per cent,
are Roman Catholics.
The Episcopians are 577,000,
the Presbyterians 441,000 and the
Methodists 22,000.
In the provinces of Leinster,
Munster and Connaught the
Catholics greatly outnumber the
Protestants, but in Ulster, the
remaining one of the four prov-
inces, the Protestants outnumber
the Catholics by nearly 200,000.
Six of the nine counties
forming the province of Ulster
the Catholics are in a consider-
able majority, but the city of Bel-
fast and its suburbs are over-
whelmingly Protestant.

INSIDE STORY OF CALMETTE CASE

Dramatic Forerunners of the
Tragedy in Paris.

AMAZING CHAIN OF EVENTS.

For Third Time Handsome Woman
Had Come Between Sain Editor and
Statesman—Caillaux's Letters to Wom-
an He Subsequently Divorced Full
of Cynical Comment.

In the Washington Post appears
what the writer, C. F. Bertell, de-
clares to be a full and accurate ac-
count of the amazing chain of events
which culminated in the assassination
of Gaston Calmette, the Paris editor,
by Mme. Caillaux.

"So intricate is the plot," says the
writer, "that for the reader to com-
prehend it it is necessary first to sketch
the dramatic personae."

Joseph Caillaux, finance minister,
former premier, aged fifty-one, florid,
bald, small, with restless eyes, a
square jaw and a despot's nature, had
a skyrocket career. He rose quickly
to a high place in the government of
his country.

"Louis Barthou, able statesman, for-
mer premier, under whose administra-
tion the three year military law was
passed as a reply to Germany's in-
crease of armaments. He was a bitter
political opponent of Caillaux.

"Gaston Calmette, intimate friend of
Prince Victor Napoleon, pretender to
the French throne, owed his prominent
position as the editor of a leading Paris
newspaper to his marriage to Mme.
Presta, daughter of the president of
the Figaro company, whom he secretly
divorced recently. Calmette, a bril-
liant polemicist, who waged the bitter-
est campaign against Caillaux known
in French public life since the Dreyfus
affair, was a sentimentalist at heart,
a white man."

"Mme. Caillaux No. 2, beautiful, of
wealthy and cultured parents, is the
former wife of Leo Claretie, Figaro's
literary critic, from whom she was di-
vorced to marry Caillaux in 1911.

"A handsome woman, the third
woman who has stood between Caillaux
and Calmette, was formerly a close
friend of the present Mme. Caillaux.
She is the wife of a distinguished play-
wright, a tall brunette, with the elege-
ance of a Parisienne and the vivacity
of an American girl.

"In 1889 a divorce took place between
an obscure couple. 'Mme. X.' pleased
with what is known as 'total beauty,'
always inspired and liked men's ad-
miration. Her successes as a beauti-
ful and smart woman are a byword in
Paris. She was thirty-two years old.

"Mme. Calmette, nee Presta, was for
a long time an inmate of a private hos-
pital. Mme. Dupre, Caillaux's first
wife, divorced Dupre in order to mar-
ry the minister. Jules Dupre was
the son of a famous painter, and he
thrice held a clerkship at \$500 a year
at the ministry of the arts. The same
year Caillaux became finance minister
and shortly afterwards married Mme.
Dupre, whose former husband imme-
diately prospered and is now filling an
important position under the ministry
of finance at \$4,253 salary.

"In this epoch Caillaux developed a
fondness for writing letters, his bene-
fiting sin. His volatile nature betrayed
him into making cynical remarks
about those of his own party and to whom
he owed his position.

"These comments as well as his own
intimate ideas about current politics
he was in the habit of committing to
writing in long letters to his wife and
women friends.

"When he met the present Mme.
Caillaux, then the wife of Leo Cla-
retie, he fell in love with her at first
sight. For awhile he corresponded
with her and soon decided to obtain
a divorce. The proceedings were be-
gun; but, as Caillaux didn't propose
to pay his wife any alimony, she used
the convincing argument afforded by
a bundle of letters written to her and
other women containing evidence dam-
aging to his political career.

Damaging Letters Photographed.
"During these negotiations these let-
ters were confided by Mme. Caillaux
No. 1 to one of her literary acquaint-
ances, with a view to their arrange-
ment for publication, and thus, it is
understood, passed through the hands
of several persons, during which pro-
cess they were photographed.

"For, when Caillaux finally yielded
to his wife's demands for \$10,000 a
year alimony, he regained possession
of the original letters. But photo-
graphic copies remained in other hands,
and it was precisely extracts from
one of these letters which Calmette
published in the Figaro and which was
the direct cause of the tragedy. For
some years the friendship between
Caillaux and Mme. Claretie went on
smoothly and Caillaux's political im-
portance grew daily.

"At this time Mme. Claretie's great-
est friend was Mme. X., who even then
was on intimate terms of friendship
with Gaston Calmette. Meanwhile
Claretie agreed to a divorce and im-
mediately the divorce was made abso-
lute in 1911.

"Caillaux was then premier of
France. To the general astonishment
he married the former Mme. Claretie
in the thick of European political con-
fusions."
