EXPECT CHILD WILL SEE THROUGH EYE OF A PIG.

Surgeons Anticipate Successful Outcome of Remarkable Operation.

An operation which marks a new step in surgery has been performed in the Baltimore Eye, Ear and Throat hospital. The entire corner of the eye of a pig was taken out and grafted on the eye of a three-month-old boy. The little patient is David Kane, who was blind at birth.

It is said by the surgeons at the hospital that every indication points to success, although the grafting of an animal's cornea on a human being has never before succeeded.

In former operations the cornea used was that of a rabbit. The recent operation was the first in the history of surgery to be performed with the eye of a pig.

Several weeks ago, by a more ordinary operation, the sight of the boy's right eye was made almost perfect. The condition of the left eye necessitated the use of the pig's cornea.

In the last operation the pig was chloroformed, the eyeball taken out and the cornea cut from it. An extraordinarily fine needle and fine silk were used in putting the cornea in place until it has grown to the child's eyeball.

Two cases are said to be on record where the grafting of human corneas gave sight to totally blind eyes.

FISH AS CHICKEN FEED.

Valuable Byproduct Utilized in the Herring Oil Industry.

A new development in a comparatively new industry is announced by Philip G. Funcke, president of an Alaskan company engaged in the extraction of oil from the herrings which swarm in the northern waters. It is the utilization of the byproducts as poultry food.

"When the fish are brought to the factory," says Mr. Funcke, "the catch is divided into five lots and distributed in equal portions. After being thoroughly boiled in huge vats the fish are forced through giant rollers, the oil flowing into receptacles provided for it and the crushed fish falling down a chute to the floor below. Here the fish are again compressed to extract the remainder of the oil, and the guano or residue is boxed up for the market. This guano was formerly sold as fertilizer, but by a special process much of it is now mixed with a small percentage of the oil and becomes an excellent poultry food."

"Analysis of the new food proves it to be rich in protein, which is one of the most valuable elements in a poultry food, and an added percentage of lime from the bones of the fish tends to make shell for eggs when fed to laying hens."

SCHOOL FOR BRIDES TO BE.

Six Months' Course in Housekeeping Planned in Cincinnati.

There will be no more "green housekeeping brides in Cincinnati" is the assertion made by Superintendent of Schools Condon, who announces that a school for prospective brides will be started when the finances of his department permit. Assistant Superintendent Roberts, who is a bachelor, thus describes the project:

"Each pupil will receive six months' training in the art of being a genuine housewife. After taking the course the bride to be will be qualified to cater for the family, should the cook strike, locate a leak in the water pipe, mend a broken doorknob or put up a shelf, scrub, wash, iron, market, give first aid to an injured member of the family, darn stockings, lay a table in the most appropriate fashion and, best of all, bid her husband in preventing that frightful waste in the American household."

School With Only Two Pupils.
