FOREST NOTES.

China imports wood pulp from Great Britain, Sweden, Norway and Germany.

The highest mountain in Montana, nearly 13,000 feet, is in the Bear-tooth national forest.

Norway has 144 tree planting societies. The first was founded in 1900, and since then 26 million trees have been planted, more than two million having been set out last year.

In many parts of the west snow is leaving the mountains earlier than usual. Foresters say that this may mean a bad fire season, and they are making plans for a hard campaign. New Jersey is said to have the greatest proportion of railroad miles of any state of the country, or one mile of railroad to every three square miles of territory. This makes an unusual risk of forest fires set by railroads.

The heavy storms in southern California during the past rainy season wiped out many miles of trails in the national forests of that part of the state. They are now being rebuilt for the coming summer, for use in fire protection. They are also of great use to tourists, campers, and prospectors.

INDUSTRIAL NEWS OF OREGON.

Salem, Or., April 20.—On Wednesday of this week bids were received by the State Highway Engineer for the construction of the Columbia hard surface highway through Clatsop county.

The Brownville cannery has placed orders for 20,000 crates to hold its pack, with Rorer Bros. planing mills at Albany.

A large dock is to be built at Port Orford by the Macleay interests of Portland.

The Lane county Manufacturer's Association is making a fight for free factory sites and municipal power at cost to get more industries.

The Pinchot policy of giving only a fifty year lease to hydro-power development companies has tied up the water powers of Oregon.

Albany has funds completed for a \$25,000 library building.

The Pacific Pressed Face Brick plant at Willamina has resumed operation, employing 75 men.

Vida, Lane county, will erect a \$3000 school house.

President Beckwith of the Workmen's Compensation commission says that only five to six hundred of three thousand manufacturers have been willing to come under the provisions of the act.

The hop crop in the Willamette Valley promises to yield a bumper crop of 160,000 bales or over this year.

Oregon's stringent eugenic marriage law has increased the fees received in Clarke county, Wash., to \$10,038 for 1913.

Hood River pays \$18,000 a year city taxes for 3000 population, and it costs \$200,000 a year for 8000 people of Hood River county.

In Marion county it is estimated

the \$1500 tax exemption would release one-third if the tax-payers from paying anything and put it on the other two-thirds.
