## MOTHER AND WIDOW GET BISHOP SCADDING ESTATE

The Portland Journal says: Mrs. Mary E. Scadding and Mrs. Elizabeth Scadding, widow and mother, respectively, of the late Bishop Charles Scadding, of the Episcopal church, are the chief beneficiaries of the estate left by him, according to his will, which was filed for probate with the county clerk today. The estate is estimated to be worth about \$5,000. In his will the late bishop stipulated that the proceeds of a life insurance policy for \$2,000 should go to his mother and the remainder of the estate to his widow, his private library excepted. Mrs. Mary Scadding's made executrix without bonds. His library he leaves to his successors in office. The will bears the date of September 16, 1913, and is witnessed by James B. Kerr, and Charles A. Hart of this city. In the document Mrs. Scadding is requested to destroy all the bishop's papers including manuscripts, save such typewritten sermons and printed articles which she believes advisable to preserve. In case his mother dies before his widow, he provides that whatever remains of the fund created by the life insurance for his mother's support shall become the property of Mrs. Mary Scadding, and on her death, that all remaining property left her by him shall be given to the Bishop of Oregon to use as he deems best, providing \$500 each is paid to his three brothers. In regard to the life insurance money left his mother, he directed that it be invested by his brother, Dr. H. Crawford Scadding, for her benefit.

## W. A. LAGORE TAKES OVER THE ORPHEUM.

A deal was closed up Friday afternoon whereby W. A. LaGore took over the Orpheum theatre and will be the sole manager of it from this time on. Mr. LaGore expects to put in a number of improvements, including a new moving picture machine and will also get a new screen. ## COUNTY COMMISSIONERS ARE AFTER SPEEDERS.

Coquille, Or., June 5.—The Coos County Commissioners yesterday ordered a circular letter sent to all the road supervisors in the county to keep a lookout for automobilists running across bridges at a high rate of speed and report all offenders to District Attorney Liljeqvist, who will prosecute them. The Commissioners in order to insure conviction in these cases and to punish the most flagrant offenders, fixed a maximum speed limit on bridges at 25 miles per hour. The matter was brought up by a report that Steve Curran was running 45 miles per hour when the China Camp bridge gave way under his machine, which weighed about two and a half tons with the load. It was also claimed that a driver named Martin went across the bridge at a speed of 60 miles per hour.—Coos Bay Times.
