**DAIRYING IN COOS COUNTY**  
That Coos county can be made a wonderful dairy center is generally admitted by everybody who is at all familiar with the situation here and that it is now forging ahead very rapidly is also evident, from the fact that we have more cow testing associations than any other county on the Pacific coast, and more than any other county in the United States, with one exception, a county in New York having the same number as we have.

The important thing now before the Coos county dairymen is to get their cows up to standard so that every cow will be a dividend payer. To do this it is necessary to get a good milk breed, and then see to it that the entire herd is brought up to the highest standard possible. There are few drawbacks to the dairy business in this section. The farmer does not have the cold winters to contend with, that prevail in the east, and this in its self is a big advantage.

### THE WAR AND BUSINESS OUT-LOOK.

There are many theories as to what will be the final outcome in a business way as a result of the great European war, and the consensus of opinion seems to be that for the present, at least, it will make business even a little tighter in the United States than it has been, but that later on it will open up and be better than ever before.

It is cited that the extra demand for supplies is going to make prices soar skyward, and that flour, sugar and many of the other necessities of life will be higher in price.

But this condition may not last long. On the other hand it appears that wages will also be higher because of the large number of foreigners leaving this country to go and help their native lands in the struggle. This will decrease the number of laborers in the country, while at the same time if the demand for supplies is greater it is sure to raise the wages of the laborer.

However, the situation should not be viewed from a commercial standpoint, as it is a humanitarian question. Thousands of lives are being sacrificed, men in the bloom of youth vigor and health. There is certainly something wrong when men who have no personal grievance toward each other must stand up and exchange rifle shots with the sole purpose of mowing down their fellowmen.

It is to be hoped that some good may come out of this war in that it will be such a lesson to humanity that the people will never permit another to get started. Someone has said that the world is not yet civilized and from all appearances the statement is true when nations supposed to be among the most intelligent in the world will go to war almost at the drop of the hat.
