GENERAL FACTS ABOUT THE PANAMA CANAL

Length, 50 miles from deep water of the Caribbean to deep water of the Pacific; from shore line to shore line about 41 miles.

Minimum depth, 41 feet. Width of channel from 300 to 1000 feet; average bottom width, 649 feet. Summit elevation, 85 feet above the sea.

Time required for passage of ships from 9½ to 11 hours, depending on size.

Cost estimated by commission, \$325,201,000. In addition to this \$50,000,000 was paid to the French company and Panama for rights.

Estimated excavation before completion, 242,000,000 cubic yards.

Estimated cost of fortifications as planned, \$12,475,328.

Record canal payroll, March 30, 1910—\$8,676 employees.

Permanent government, the governor of the Panama canal to serve four years at an annual salary of \$10,000.

History of the Canal.

1529—Idea of canal across Panama first conceived by Alvarado de Saavedra.

1814—Construction of canal decreed by Spain.

1825—Concession given to Baron Thierry by Simon Bolivar.

1846—United States signs basic treaty with New Grenada, assuming obligation to protect traffic across the isthmus.

1850—Clayton-Bulwer treaty providing for safety and neutrality of canal signed with Great Britain.

1870—United States government makes first survey.

1880—French company under De Lesseps fires first blast.

1902—Hay-Pauncefote treaty signed United States assuming obligation to build the canal.

1903—Negotiations with Columbia fell through but were perfected with the newly established republic of Panama.

1904—United States secured title from French company for \$40,000,000.

1907—Under Lieutenant Colonel Goethals actual construction began on April 1.

1914—Canal opened to the world August 15th.

Firewood Consumption in Oregon.

Washington, D. C.—There are 520,500 cords of wood, valued at \$1,978,000, consumed on the farms of Oregon annually, according to a report which has just been issued by the United States Department of Agriculture. The total yearly firewood consumption in this state is 1,036,000 cords with a value of \$4,334,000. The consumption in the cities of the state is 475,000 cords and 40,440 cords are used in the mineral operations of Oregon each year.

In Continental United States the annual consumption of firewood amounts to 85,937,000 cords, valued at \$250,000,000. Of this amount 69,961,000 cords are used on the farms 14,222,000 cords in the cities of the nation and 1,751,000 cords are used in the mines of the United States. The average value of wood consumed in the United States is \$2.91 per cord and \$4.18 in this state. The average consumption per farm in the United States is 11 cords per annum.
