### Oregon Farm Statistics.

Oregon has 45,502 farms; of this number 38,643 are operated by owners and managers and 6,859 by tenants.

Eighty-five per cent of the farms of this state are operated by owners and managers and 15 per cent by tenants.

The farm home owners and managers of Oregon cultivate 3,274,000 acres of land and the tenants till 1,001,000 acres in this state.

The value of the land and buildings of the tenant farms in this state is \$91,065,000; that of the home owners and managers is \$364,512,000.

### Norway Creamery First.

For the third time in five years the Norway creamery, owned by J. H. McClosky, took first prize at the state fair. The score of the butter was 96. The award carries \$30 in cash, a \$50 cup and other good prizes. Mr. McClosky is also entitled to some sort of prize from the citizens of the Coquille valley for bringing this section such a fine advertisement as a dairymaking country—Coquille Herald
