Bad Accident at Coquille.
About 11:15 this morning Edna McDonald, the 20-year-old daughter of M. McDonald, of this city, who has recently been employed as a stenographer in the Tide Granite & Trust Co.'s office here, was struck by a logging train, on the railroad near the cemetery so that her left leg was run over to the calf and left hanging by a shred of skin. She was at once taken to Dr. Cullin's office and Dr. V. L. Hamilton, of this city, and Dr. J. G. Johnson, of Myrtle Point, were summoned to aid in the amputation of the crushed limb. Counselor C. T. Skeels was one of the first to reach Miss McDonald after the accident and it is his account that was given by Miss McDonald had been to the cemetery for butter milk and had just started away alongside the logging train that was slowly approaching the station with a string of empties. Dropping up on the little platform in the section house, her foot slipped and she slid so near the car that her clothing was caught by one of the bumpers and she was thrown forward in such a way that her left leg was involuntarily thrown out, probably to balance herself as she fell, under the wheels and was crushed. She did not faint when Mr. Skeels went to her assistance wanted to know how badly she was hurt. Miss McDonald was universally beloved and it was with a thrill of horror that the news of the accident was heard by our people.—Comilla Sentinel.

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NINE COOS STUDENTS AT U OF O.

Coos County is well represented at the State University at Eugene. Coos county is represented by nine students at the University this year. The total enrollment has gone to the 740 mark and all indications point toward a material gain in February which will probably show the enrollment over 800. Last year the registration during the first semester was less than 700, this year's student body showing an increase of nearly 100 students over the number here at this time last year. Dal M. King, of Myrtle Point, has re-entered the University this year for graduate work in the law department, he having been graduated with the 1914 class. The figures mentioned above include only the students enrolled for resident work in the College of Arts and Sciences. Besides these 740 resident students there must be added 80 students in the medical department at Portland, 200 in the law department, 145 correspondence study students, 98 students in the med department, 522 students in the extension classes and 100 in the summer school. This gives a total of 1919 and shows that the great increase in enrollment for the University since this date last year is over twelve and one-half per cent; both on the campus and outside an increase is noted in every item. The registrar's list includes the following Coos county students: Dal M. King and K. McCloskey, of Myrtle Point; Gretchen Sherwood, of Coquille; Paul Reigard, Madge Barry, Max Reigard, Charles Haines and Lucy Powers, of Marshfield; Hugh Watkins, of Bandon.
