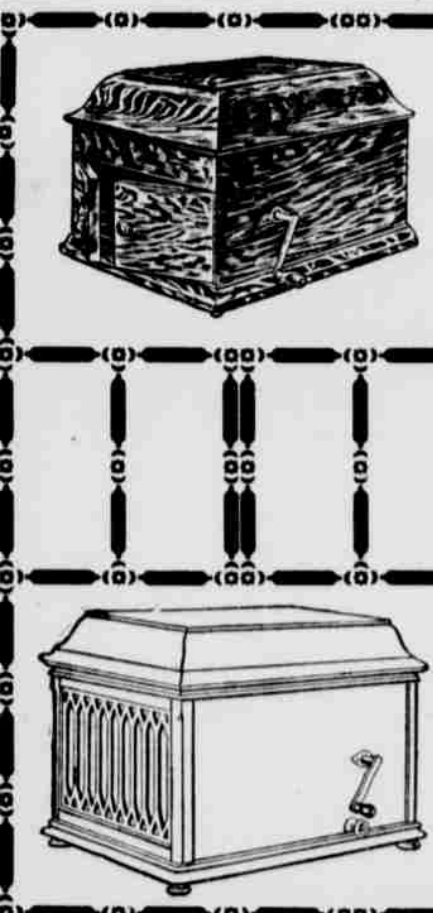

PRESIDING OFFICERS IN THE STATE LEGISLATURE

Salem, Or., Jan. 11.—Ben Selling of Portland was elected speaker by a vote of 37 to 22 over Allen Eaton of Eugene. Pierce of Coos and Curry voted for Selling and Barrow of Coos voted for Eaton. W. Laid Thompson of Lakeview was elected president of the senate. Both houses are overwhelmingly Republican. There was a sharp contest for the speakership but the successful candidate for the presidency had practically no opposition. W. D. Wood received three votes for the office.

DR. WITHYCOMBE IS GOVERNOR OF OREGON

Salem, Or., Jan. 12.—Dr. James Withycombe, Republican, was inaugurated governor succeeding Oswald West, Democrat, before today's session of the legislature. At the request of the new governor the ceremonies were simple. In his inaugural address he recommended that the legislature set a record for brevity and especially for the number of laws passed. He advocated anti-liquor regulations that can be enforced. He favored making several elective officers appointive and consolidating the various commissions, suggesting a committee be appointed to make a general survey of the best way to centralize state government, and report in 1917.

WISDOM FROM MEXICO

General Villa is said to be addicted to elaborate forms of speech. Some of the proverbs of his nation, which he is never tired of quoting, are interesting: A close mouth catches no flies. Your worst enemy is always one of your own trade. Smear yourself with honey and you will be devoured by flies. Better be the head of a mouse than the tail of a lion. Although a monkey is clothed in silk he still remains a monkey. Get a name for early rising, and you may lie abed all day. To a good appetite no bread is too hard. Some of these are certainly not inappropriate under existing conditions.

INTERESTING EVENTS

Wheat has raised in price over the two dollars per bushel mark. President Wilson's friends interpret his Indianapolis speech as the announcement of his candidacy for re-election in 1916. Governor Bleess of South Carolina has granted full pardon to full 1500 convicted persons paroled by him since the first of 1911. Villa and other Mexican generals promise general Scott that they will prevent further border fighting. The Steamer Eureka, bound from San Francisco to Ventura was wrecked on the potato patch outside the Golden Gate last Saturday. Sixteen of the crew, including Capt. Paulsen were rescued, but the second mate, James Bolger, was drowned. The Eureka formerly was in the Coos Bay trade.

The Southern Pacific has announced the rates which will apply to tourist travel between Portland and San Francisco during the period of the great exposition, tickets to be on sale daily between Feb. 15 and Nov. 30. On 30 day limit tickets the rate will be \$55; on 30 day tickets, \$59; on special occasions, such as important conventions, etc., a round trip rate will be made up of \$26.75 with a 15 day limit and stop-over privilege on the return trip. To the ex-position at San Diego, the railroads will make a round trip rate of \$50.25 with a limit of 40 days and stop-over privileges both ways.

Potato growers of Oregon are asking that a strict quarantine be established against all potatoes shipped from California owing to the danger of the tuber moth gaining a foothold in this state. So far as known, one 750 potatoes are not entirely free from this pest and the state board of horticulture has been asked to take such action as will insure future safety.

According to plans and estimates just completed by the Federal public health department, the proposed development in the upper Coquille basin will involve an expenditure of approximately \$3,000,000, involving an irrevocable area of nearly 4000 acres. If the work is finally started out as now planned, the surplus water of the Coquille river above Bandon will be used for irrigation.
