The late Charles Coghlan wrote "Her Ladyship" with the idea of fitting the title role for that difficult but widely known stage personage, Lily Langtry. When his gifted daughter, Gertrude Coghlan, made her debut with him in "The Royal Box" he immediately decided to sequester the play for her personal use. He afterwards made her a present of the manuscript and she used it as a starting vehicle; and it is now offered for the first time in pictorial form by the Sellig Polyscope Co. with Gertrude Coghlan in the title role.

"Her Ladyship" has for its theme, the marriage of a lady of noble birth to a self-made merchant, the strenuous efforts of the selfish, jealous, though pious sister-in-law of the husband to selfishly disrupt the union. Richard Dixon, the plain spoken but not over diplomatic husband

is made to believe that the gentle Lady Cecil married him for his money alone, while her ladyship, through the same insidious channels of information, is almost convinced through the apparent consistency of events that her husband wished selfishly to elevate himself socially through an alliance with her. Lady Cecil has a startling reversion to the ways of her girlhood and dropping her dignity, seeks forgetfulness and excitement in the wildest kind of gaiety. Her poor husband, mortified and silent, is spurred to deeper dejection by the colorful insinuations developed by the new sensational conditions as noted by the jealous sister-in-law, Janet Marsh.

He is worked up to such a frame of mind that he is made to readily believe that one of his guests, Lord Sibley, who has been thrown considerably with his wife of late, was a former fiancee of hers and is renewing his attentions; and furthermore that Lady Cecil has acquired the choral habit. This latter weakness is greatly exaggerated. As a climax through the cleverly planned scheme Janet makes it appear that Lady Cecil is about to further disgrace Richard by an elopement.

The crafty Janet's scheme for preparing an unusually strong sleeping potion for Lady Cecil is overcome by Little Elsie, the 9 year old daughter of Dixon, who tells of her aunt entering the room while Lady Cecil is absent at a ball, while Walter Dixon Richard's nephew, corroborates the testimony of seeing her there, examining the drug vials at one o'clock in the morning. Through this testimony and events following it, the husband is brought to see clearly the great conspiracy in his family. He is happily reunited to his wife, she has a better understanding of him and the mischievous and malignant Janet is driven from the scene.

This play for originality, bears the scholarly style of Charles Coghlan, from its simplest materialization to its loftiest sentiment. It has both force, finish and a lucidity of words and consistent action that is altogether original and refreshing. It impresses a big lesson in love, in fear and in hate but never worries or confuses the observer. It furnishes a strong preaching to jealous and discontented women; admonishes weak and suspicious husbands and it gives a new angle of value to the counsel of loving but meddling relatives. Above all it advises repose and confidence in the women men have chosen for their wives and not to suffer the castle of their happiness to be wrecked by the first vicious breath of designing scandal-loving enemies.

The September number of the Quarterly of the Oregon Historical Society for September comes to our desk. Peck, Rock Island, Ill., March 19, 1852, throwing additional light on the early life of Jesse Applegate, a pioneer of 1843 and one of the most remarkable men who ever made Oregon his adopted state; Letter of Quincy Adams Brooks giving an account of crossing the plains in 1851.
