The coyote had entered the tent of Doyle and bitten him while he was asleep. The teeth of the animal had entered above and below the eye. Without waiting for daylight, Doyle caught a horse and started from his camp on Jenkins creek for this city.

BURNS RELICS FOUND.

\$50,000 Glen Riddle Manuscripts Are Saved For Scotland.

Philadelphia.—Robert Burns' famous Glen Riddle manuscripts, for which the patriots of Scotland have been searching in this continent and in Europe, have been discovered. They are in the possession of John Gribbel, who announced that he would return them to the people of Scotland under a deed of trust, which will insure their permanent safe keeping.

These manuscripts were recently sold by the Liverpool Athenaeum for \$50,000. "Two weeks ago," said Mr. Gribbel, "I was astonished to have a dealer come into my office and offer me the Glen Riddle manuscripts. I made an investigation and found them to be genuine."

Mr. Gribbel later declined to say what he paid for them.

"FINDERS KEEPERS."

Road Must Return Unclaimed Money to Passenger Who Found It.

Mercer, Pa.—The old question of ownership of property found by passengers on railway trains promises to be a question no more, following conclusion of the suit instituted against the Pennsylvania railroad by C. E. Battieger, who found a purse containing \$83.50.

The jury returned a verdict for Battieger in the sum of \$85.24, principal and interest. Battieger turned the find over to the conductor, waited until the expiration of the legal time limit and then claimed it. The company refused to give it to him, although the owner had appeared.

GIRL, ONLY 13, FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER

Faints When Convicted of Killing Her Playmate.

Prince Albert, Sask.—Standing in the prisoners' dock, with pale face and an evident realization of her predicament, Kathleen Oka Simmon, thirteen years old and small for her age, heard a jury return a verdict of murder in the first degree against her in the local courtroom. As the foreman uttered the word "guilty" the little girl, who was standing alone and nervously twisting the ends of two braids of hair thrown over her shoulders, collapsed and fell forward, unconscious.

Earlier in the trial she made a complete confession of her crime, which was the killing of Julia Jenex, a playmate, nine years old, on the afternoon of July 21 last. She told of a trip into the woods which they had taken to get berries and roots for medicinal purposes and how her little companion had bothered her from the beginning of their walk. She said that finally, after she had warned Julia several times not to plague her, Julia picked up a prairie chicken as they crossed a field and deliberately struck her in the face with it.

She told of throwing her playmate to the ground and of the struggle which ensued when Julia in a rage tried to get to her feet. They fought with fists and nails until Julia was overcome, the witness said, and then she was so enraged that she sought for something to strike her with. She picked up a shovel and, after knocking the Jenex girl senseless with it, pounded her face until it was unrecognizable and killed her.

29 BABIES; WANT MORE.

Father Would Like Enough to Make a Nice Family.

Stevens Point, Wis.—Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kostruck of Stevens Point broke the Wisconsin record for babies when their twenty-ninth offspring arrived.

Mr. and Mrs. Kostruck don't think twenty-nine babies too many. In fact, they said they wouldn't mind if there were a few more. "I want just enough to make a nice family," said the delighted Mr. Kostruck.
