DUTCH BELTED CATTLE.

Once Nearly Exterminated, They Are Now Bred by the Nobility.

Datch belted cattle originated in Holland several hundred years ago. At the time of the great Holland wars they were nearly exterminated by the tavading armies, and the few that re mained became the property of the nobility, who have bred them pure ever since, but do not willingly part with them. They are known in Holland as Veldlargers, which name means "wrapped around with a sheet."

In color they are black, with a band of pure white entirely around the body. They may also have white fore feet. white hind feet and legs up to the gambrels and a white switch. The 'belt" varies in width. On some it b out a few inches wide. On others it reaches back on the hips and forward on the shoulders. Usually it covers the sody from just in front of the hijasearly to the shoulders.

GIRL, ONLY 13, FOUND **GUILTY OF MURDER**

Faints When Convicted of KIIIing Her Flaymate.

Prince Albert, Sask.-Standing in the prisoners' dock, with pale face and an evident realization of her predicament, Kathleen Oka Simmon, thirteen years old and small for her age, heard a jury return a verdict of murder in the first degree against her in the local courtroom. As the foreman uttered the word "Guilty" the little girl, who was standing alone and nervously twisting the ends of two braids of hair thrown over her shoulders, collapsed and fell forward, unconscious.

Earlier in the trial she made a complete confession of her crime, which was the killing of Julia Jeriex, a playmate, nine years old, on the afternoon of July 21 last. She told of a trip into the woods which they had taken to get berries and roots for medical purposes and how her little companion had their walk. She said that finally, after she had warned Julia several times not to plague her. Julia picked up a prairie chicken as they crossed a field and deliberately struck her in the face with it.

She told of throwing her playmate to the ground and of the struggle which ensued when Julia in a rage tried to get to her feet. They fought with fists and nails until Julia was overcome, the witness said, and then she was so enraged that she sought for something to strike her with. She picked up a shovel and, after knocking the Jenex girl senseless with it, pounded her face until it was unrecognizable and killed her.
