FORT ORFORD REPORT.

(From Fort Orford Tribune.)

That a country editor is versatile and can be proficient in more than one art, was shown in Fort Orford last Saturday night when the editor of the Tribune was one of the winners in a clothes hanging contest in this case however, it has been suggested that the editor probably missed his calling in following the printers trade.

Clyde Inman, Supt of the Hydro-Sixes mine on the Sixes river, was drowned in Rogue river at Mule creek last Thursday. In company with two companions, Messrs Wall and Eggers, young Inman was in the Rogue river country prospecting, and on the day of the tragedy had gone in the river, bathing. He was unable to swim and getting into the swift current of the stream was carried into deep water and drowned.

The father, who was in California, was notified of the drowning and he telegraphed to spare no expense in patrolling the river with the result that the body was found Saturday about a mile and a half below the scene of the accident. The remains were taken to the railroad and shipped to California for burial.

The deceased was about 19 years of age and was a bright, gentlemanly young fellow who during his short residence in this section made many warm friends. Besides his father, the deceased is survived by his mother and a younger brother and sister who are residents of California.

A special tax levy of 1 1/2 mills was voted at the annual school meeting to pay interest on school bonds and for general school purposes. This is 1 mill less than was voted last year.

T. J. From reports that the sheep owners of Brush creek sold recently for 20 cts a pound.

Two Ford automobiles driven by Emery Whitworth and Clint Maleborn, collided on the mountain last Sunday. No one was hurt and the Whitworth car, though considerably damaged, was able to proceed on to Wedderburn. Mr. Maleborn was coming down the mountain but had drawn to one side of the road and stopped his car when Mr. Whitworth's car skidded on a sliding place and the two jockey's locked horns. The Whitworth car was a new one, as he had trouble with his old machine last week and took it to Bandon and traded it in on one just from the shop.

It is only a matter of building the bridge and laying the rails now, before the cars will be running into this valley from the outside world. In a couple of weeks trains will be running to scenic spots on the Willamette Pacific and another lap will be covered by the garished cars.

The Rivers and Harbors committee of the National Congress is in San Francisco to see the fair and inspect public works in California. They came by invitation of the Legislature of California which pays their expenses. Portland has invited the committee to visit that city at the expense of the city and Marshfield has also come forward with a similar proposition in the interest of Coos bay.

The West Shore Oil Company is making plans to order within the next few days 17 tons of casing for the well located near the Coos-Curry County line. It is estimated that the equipment will be brought in and installed in the well, and operations resumed about July 15th. The promoters are all citizens of Coos County, the heaviest stockholders being business men and merchants of Bandon.

When the light house is changed to the south side of the river one of the features is that it will be lighted and operated by electricity. The department is engaged with the preparation of the plans for the change at present but just when the move will be made, can not be stated.

The Fines Stand

Refusal to intervene in the matter of two fines of \$100 each, one against Captain F. W. Panter and the second, the Myrtle Transportation company I made by the Department of Commerce in a letter to Collector of Customs Burke in Portland.

The fines were levied by Edwards and Fuller government, inspectors of oysters and bulls, some time ago for a fee for an alleged violation of the law about the Telegram on the Coquille River.

Captain Panter was accused as acting as both master and pilot of the Telegram without a license from Bay Lines.

NORTH BEND LABOR TROUBLES

Contractor Sandberg gets into Hot Water With Bay Town Citizens on the Matter of His Employees.

There was a good deal of feeling among some of the North Bend people today because of the employment of outside labor on the part of Edward Sandberg, who has the contract for building the Connecticut avenue sewer.

Mr. Sandberg had some local men employed and it is stated that he discharged these men to make places for Finlanders whom he brought in here yesterday.

The position was taken by many in North Bend that the money for the sewer was paid by the property owners and that in the employment of labor local people should be given preference, especially as there were quite a number out of work.

Mr. Sandberg stated today that there was nothing in his contract requiring him to employ local men but that he wanted to as far as was necessary for him to have some experienced ditchers and pipe layers and that he had sent for them. He claimed that the work could not be done at a profit if he had to employ inexperienced workmen.

It was stated that the foreigners who had been brought in here were arranging to live in a house by themselves and do their own cooking and that others had secured board at a very cheap rate in Marshfield and were walking back and forth to and from work. It was also claimed that the men were to be paid very small wages. These facts made quite a stir at North Bend and there was a good deal of talk. Nothing definite had been done this afternoon—Coos Bay Times.

The steamer Wolverine which has been tied up at the Moore mill dock for some time has been sold south and will be put in use on the Sacramento river.

Occasionally one will hear the remark "I wish I was out of this town", and then one feels like saying, "I wish you were," for a man who stands on the street corners, chewing and spitting, and telling obscene stories, cursing the town, finding fault with his grandmother because she was a woman, claiming that merchants are a lot of thieves, that the lawyers and newspaper men would skin a man to a finish, and a whole lot more, is a nuisance and abomination.

The government has received \$99,40 in settlement for a single sugar pine tree that was cut in trespass in the Stanislaus National Forest in California, and which yielded more than enough actual lumber to build a good sized suburban frame house. The tree yielded 19,800 board feet and was valued at \$5.25 per thousand feet. Not many trees contain enough lumber to build a two feet board walk nearly 7 miles long, and it is believed to be the first case on record in which a single tree felled in a national forest was valued at almost \$100 on the stump although national forest timber is frequently sold at considerably higher rates.

Wm. Cross, for seven years an employee of the McDonald and Vaughn camp near Marshfield was killed by being crushed between cars and log freight they carried, recently. He was 38 years of age, a Spanish American war veteran and a native of Missouri.
