J. E. Montgomery left yesterday forenoon for Powers, where he will look over the proposition of installing a central office in that city. It has been but a short time since the company inaugurated a system of long distance to the town, but since then the calls for a central office and the installation of private phones has been so great that the company has decided to take the matter up and install the local service. It is expected that the work will be started within a short time.—Coquille News.

The knights of Pythias of Oregon will hold a state function or convocation August 18th, next at Crater Lake. One of their purposes is to secure the presence of a large number of noted men. The next proximity of Medford to the site selected for the

General Portfiro Diaz, former president of Mexico and who for 35 years was master of the destinies of Mexico, died in Paris on July 2nd. He was 85 years of age.

The soundings on the Siuslaw recently made under the direction of Government Engineer C. R. Wright shows considerably more water than last year. The survey is satisfactory in showing that the placing of the jetties in that stream has had the desired result and forced the channel to clear itself.

Arthur Coach made the Sentinel office a call one day lately and told about the strenuous work he doing at his place down near Lampa. He has been transplanting watermelons and other vegetables by the thousand and hopes to be able to supply all the towns in Coos county with a good quality line by fall.—Coquille Sentinel.

A rancher who is cultivating some of the reclaimed willow swamp south of the river says he has sold as high as \$200 worth of potatoes from an acre of such land, and he doesn't think land that will produce like that is overrated at \$200 an acre.—Coquille Sentinel.

A Portland paper says that preliminary negotiations are on for the construction of a breakwater, now operated between Portland and Marshfield by the Boston and Pacific. Work on the new road between Eugene and Marshfield is well advanced and it is said

will be inaugurated in January, so with the operation of that line the company must cease steaming the Breakwater between two points also reached by its rail line. It is thought that the steamer will be taken to New Orleans for the Gulf trade. If the negotiations are brought to a successful conclusion, the Breakwater will be returning to her old cruising grounds. Formerly she belonged to United Fruit company, and plied out of New Orleans to Puerto Cortez, in Spanish Honduras. The steamer has accommodations for 90 first class passengers and take care of 30 persons in the steerage.—Coquille Sentinel.

The supreme court affirmed the decision of the lower court in the case of Fannie O'Donnell, charged with selling liquor in her apartments at Empire over a year ago and she will have to spend 60 days in jail and pay a fine of \$200.

The second trial of Neva Hatcher for contributing to the delinquency of Pauline Stillwell resulted in a verdict of guilty. As the old jury had tried the first case, one of them were excused and a new panel sought. When called to the bar for sentence and asked if he had any reason why same should not be pronounced, Walter Sinclair, his attorney, made a strong plea for a partial sentence, inasmuch as the man had a family to support. Judge Cole refused the plea saying that he did not feel inclined to show leniency to a man who had committed a crime of this character. Although he sympathized with his family he felt that the community should be protected from such men as the defendant. He was given the maximum sentence which is from three to ten years in the penitentiary.

A revival in railroad and lumber industries is seen in big car orders that are to be placed by the Chicago & Northwestern and the Burlington railroads. They are asking bids from Oregon mills on material for about 1500 freight cars each. More than 50,000 feet of lumber is involved in the order.  
 These roads have built 100 wooden cars for two years. Before that time they constructed almost 30 a day. —Oregon Coast Daily Tribune.
