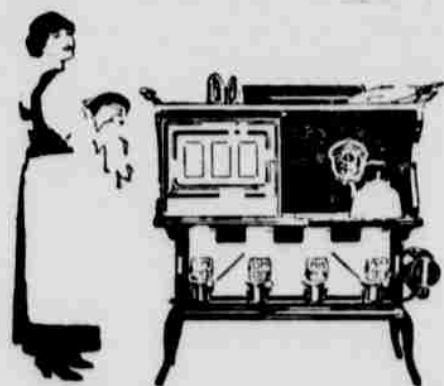

PORT ORFORD REPORT

(From Port Orford Tribune.)

The mail schedule between Bandon and Port Orford has again been changed, and Contractor Davidson now make the round trip in his auto. This will cause the mail to reach Port Orford and the Rogue river 24 hours earlier than it has been.

Although advertised but a day and a half, a large crowd assembled at the Agate Carnival pavilion last Saturday evening to witness a wrestling contest between Eddie O'Connell of Portland, and M. G. Lutsey, Curry county's wrestling cheese maker.

The match gave every evidence of being on the square, and was well worth seeing for those who care for the game, and had it been known further ahead of time that O'Connell would be here, many more would have attended.

The first fall went to O'Connell in 31 minutes in a head-lock that made Lutsey quit. GOLD BEACH GOSSIP

(From the Gold Beach Globe)

Mrs. Wesley Miller went to Grant's Pass last week to investigate the rumor that Mr. Miller had departed for parts unknown and left his automobile in a garage there with a For Sale notice tacked on it.

A quiet wedding took place here Saturday morning in which the principal actors were Bill Winegar and Dona Rodgers with Justice of the Peace Stafford binding the bargain. When this couple came here from Bandon some two weeks ago in their open boat, the Globe made mention of the fact and that Bill was accompanied by a woman. This they took exception to and took the editor to task for not saying Mr. and Mrs. Winegar.

A. Aubry, once more in a small row boat ran the rapids of the treacherous Rogue river, between Grant's Pass and its mouth, arrived here last Friday. Mr. Aubrey is an expert boatman as well as a fisherman. He made the trip without accident of any kind, bringing with him from the Devil's Stairs, C. H. Pittinger, who two days previously had received a broken leg.

R. J. Long, black sand expert and former deputy sheriff of Los Angeles, county, California, is awaiting trial in Coquille unable to furnish bonds, according to reports brought to this city by county officials yesterday afternoon. Long was arrested in Portland by Deputy Sheriff Laird early this week, charged with obtaining money on worthless drafts issued by himself.

Long operated in this city for several weeks endeavoring to get local capital interested in a machine for separating gold from black sand. He told acquaintances here that he had considerable property in Los Angeles county that he could mortgage and obtain the money to complete the machine, but that this would take too much time. Before leaving again, however, he issued several checks amounting to nearly two hundred dollars which were cashed by local business men who learned later that Long had no funds in the bank.

After his arrest it is stated that his father wired the county officials that he was sending money to cover his son's indebtedness, but this has not yet been received.—Coos Bay Times
