**The Schools of San Diego**

San Diego, Cal., Editor Bandon Recorder:

Becoming better acquainted with the city I have given some attention to its grand school houses and I have felt interested to investigate the inside. To receive trustworthy information I called at the office of Superintendent of public instruction located in the city hall a structure well worth a visit.

There I was informed that the city now employs three hundred and eighty two teachers in its grammar schools and one hundred forty four in its high schools. In addition to these are the teachers employed in the Catholic and many private schools.

The grammar schools of San Diego amount to one hundred and twenty two buildings and twenty four buildings are needed for the high school. This for the city proper. The adjoining districts are not included. The total number of scholars are 33315 children in the Grammar schools and 2591 in the high schools.

These figures prove that a further investigation would be of interest.

Most of these buildings are fire proof and of the old continental style with large columns. Surrounding them are playgrounds with, in many cases, swings and gymnastic paraphernalia or large and well kept grass plots, the outer edge ornamented with pepper trees, palms and gum trees.

Today I took time to pay a visit to the nearest school to where I live, the Washington school. I was so much pleased with it that I must tell you about it.

Although the buildings are fire proof they have strong fire escapes and inside fire hose and chemical extinguishers the steps are also made of cement, eight feet wide. The rooms are very high and all the many windows are open to keep the atmosphere clean and healthy. Each child has his own desk. In every room that I entered the desks were so arranged that light could enter only over the left shoulder and thus prevent the different eye complaints and unnecessary eye strain is avoided. I have particularly observed that children do not have to use glasses.

In all corridors are drinking fountains of the new construction, cups or glasses are done away with. From here I visited the rooms. The teachers were very obliging and pleased to answer questions.

There were classes for sewing, workshops for the boys containing machinery of all kinds and materials from which to construct various articles of furniture and iron and brass articles. Also one class was engaged in mechanical drawing. Boat building was also represented. In all classes were samples of free hand drawing and color painting, or cabinets of minerals gathered by scholars, shells from the ocean beach, taken and named for instruction, pressed plants, botanically investigated and named according to Prof. Liebig, the great Swedish botanist.

Then I entered the cooking department containing 20 one burner gas stoves and a large electric stove. In this class instruction was given in regard to the cutting up of meat for cooking purposes illustrated by picture.

Further came the great gymnasium with room 66 ft. by 100 ft. Over this was the auditorium containing 500 seats and a large platform with drop curtain.

The youngest children were instructed on the playgrounds to march form figures and do fancy stepping.

The Raja Yoga system of educating will soon be inaugurated, this system, instructed on to teachers has wonderful advantages over the present system of teaching as the last has over the village school fo of fifty or more years ago.

Next Sunday evening I shall visit one of these schools to receive lessons personally.

I may write you about it.
