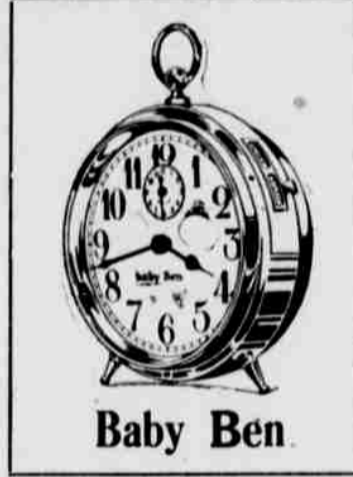

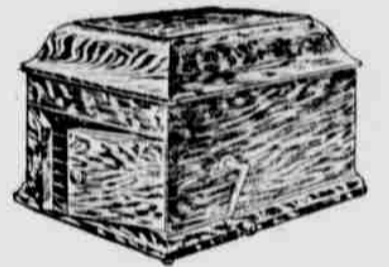

Three Noted Stars Appear Together in Tolstoy's "A Woman's Resurrection."

Three great dramatic stars, each noted for abounding genius, appear together in the William Fox production of Count Leo Tolstoy's "A Woman's Resurrection" comes to the Grand Theatre, Friday December 24th and in it can be seen not only Betty Nansen, the famous Royal Actress of Europe, but also William Kodley, the favorite young American leading man and Edward Jose, famous to the William Fox public by his striking work in "A Fool There Was", "The Celebrated Scandal" and "Ann Kerenine," supported by a splendid cast.  
Betty Nansen, as Katusha Maslova, gives a marvelous moving performance of the erring woman who, more sinned against than sinning, falls into the foulest depths of degradation, only to find on the wild steppes of snow-covered Siberia a spiritual rebirth. It can be said in fact that she has reached heights of drama which would seem impossible of human attainment and has made of Katusha a haunting picture of wonderful power and beauty. From the earlier scenes of the play where Katusha is betrayed in the last great climax Mrs. Nansen's art rings strong and true. In the court-room scene where, although innocent, she is condemned to the horrors of Siberia for life, she attains a lofty summit of emotional acting that

for its sweep and almost painful impressiveness must rank with the great dramatic creations of all time.  
As Prince Dimitri, Mr. Kelley gives a superb performance which runs the gamut from love to burning remorse and despair. He ably suggests the regret of the man who has betrayed Katusha and then faces her again years later, when she is a stolid, hardened woman of the streets in a prison dock charged with intent to kill. He is on the jury that settles the wretched woman's fate and after it is pronounced he, with noble self-abnegation follows the dreary train of prisoners to Siberia and at last repairs the great wrong that he did in his youth. It is an inspiring performance all through and marks a distinct epoch in Mr. Kelley's art. From first to last he is impressive, competent and sincere.  
To Edward Jose falls the remarkably effective part of Simonson, the faithful servant of Dimitri who befriends the miserable Katusha in her darkest hours and in the end gives up his life to save his master's. Simonson is a most unusual role and in Edward Jose's hands it stands out with sharp distinction. Nobody could fail to be moved by the dog-like devotion of Simonson, enduring the knout insults and finally death itself to protect his master. Great work as has been done hitherto by Mr. Jose it must be said that he has never been seen to such great advantage as in this deeply sympathetic role.
