**AIR PROPELLER TO DRIVE NEW ROGUE RIVER BOAT**

Our enterprising townsmen Frank Owens is now having a new light draught river boat built, with the expectation of making a round trip daily from Gold Beach to Cannon Beach, a distance of twenty six miles above Agness and fifty six from Gold Beach. This is to be a twenty four foot craft and will be equipped with a thirty horse power gasoline engine, and was known as an air propeller. The boat will be seven feet wide across the bottom and nine feet wide across the top, with a square stern and bow. When loaded it is only expected to draw 12 inches. The propeller will be seven feet across and work in the air as does the ordinary one in water.—Globe.

**GEO. HOCKSIE, OF HARBOR IS FOUND DEAD IN BED**

Geo. E. Hocksie, a resident of Harbor, Oregon, was found dead in bed Friday afternoon, June 2nd. A coroner's jury was empaneled Saturday to inquire into the cause of death, which found that death was caused by natural causes. Mr. Hocksie was a middle-aged man and has one son in the Willamette valley. The remains were buried in the Harbor cemetery.—Globe

**CRESCENT CITY MAY BOND**

An election has been called in Test Norte county Calif., on the proposition to bond the county for \$100,000 for the improvement of Crescent City harbor. It is provided that the bonds shall not be issued until the government makes an appropriation for the same purpose; and that the money be expended under the supervision of the government engineers.—Globe

**CATCHING UP**

Under Woodrow Wilson the United States is catching up with the rest of the world. After years of Republican blunder even to propose action President Wilson and the Democrats of Congress have faced the rural credits question and have almost completed legislation upon it.

During all the years of Republican domination—

In Germany the "Landwirtschaft" system, organized and controlled by the government, was providing loans to farmers at 4 1/2 per cent.

In Switzerland land-credit associations, operated by the state, were making loans to the needs of the farmers at three and four per cent.

**COOS COUNTY PRESBYTERY MEETS AT COUNTY SEAT**

The Coos Presbytery met at the Presbyterian church here yesterday afternoon, with Rev. J. S. Stubbfield, of Marshfield as moderator. Those present were Rev. Dr. Andrew J. Montgomery, representing the synodical committee, Rev. Adolph Haberly and Rev. W. S. Smith of Bandon; Rev. J. P. Vernon, of Myrtle Point; Rev. E. S. Shimmin, of Coquille; and T. E. Russell and Virgil E. Watters, representing the North Bend church.

The business of the Presbytery was to apportion the Home Mission funds granted to this Presbytery by the Synod. As there were not sufficient funds to provide for resident pastors at both North Bend and Coquille, it was decided to place both fields in charge of Mr. Shimmin, who will continue to reside at Coquille and conduct the morning services at the church here; and who will also preach for the North Bend church each Sunday evening.—Sentinel.

The Southern Pacific has during the past week added to its passenger equipment this side of the Umpqua, two vestibule coaches, which are now running through here. These coaches were ferried over the river, the addition being rendered necessary by the growing excursion business in the Coos Bay section.—Sentinel.

W. H. Waan, the expert who has been at work auditing the county books for the past three months closed up the work on Saturday of last week. Among other information he learned that his researches show that there were \$602,000 of delinquent taxes due Coos county the first of January, 1916. This does not include the 1915 taxes.—Sentinel.

Mr. and Mrs. D. P. Strong started Wednesday morning for Junction City, where they will visit Mrs. Strong's sister. Before returning they will attend the annual encampment of the G. A. R. at Eugene. They plan to be absent two or three weeks.—Sentinel.

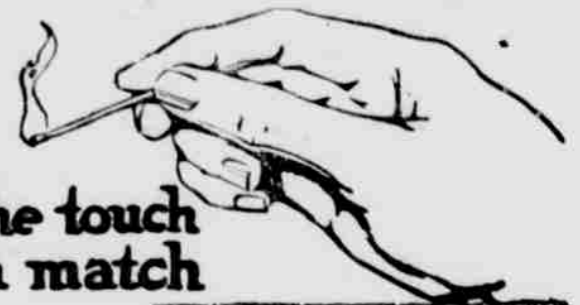

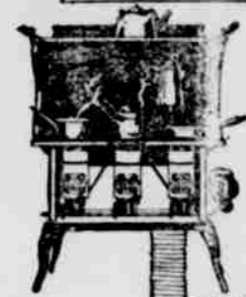
