PROMPT WORK SAVES KRUSE SHINGLE MILL

Timely Arrival Of Steamer Dispatch Saves Plant. Fire Starts Near Boiler and Gains Headway Rapidly. Roof Nearly Burned Off

Nothing but the timely arrival of the steamer Dispatch saved the Kruse Shingle mill, near Prosper, from destruction Wednesday afternoon, when fire broke out in the boiler room shortly after four o'clock. However, with the aid of the pumps and men on the Dispatch, the mill crew, under Supt. Geo. Geisendorfer, soon had the flames under control. The east end of the roof on the main building was completely burned away and the rest of the roof so badly burned that it will have to be rebuilt. Outside of three belts that were burned, the machinery was little damaged and the mill resumed operations Thursday noon.

The fire was first discovered by Dick Crain, who was locking through the mill. It was then only a small blaze near the boiler, but by the time he had leaned through an opening in the wall and spread the alarm the entire tar roof covering was a blaze and he had to step lively to escape from the room. In less than five minutes the roofs of the boiler room and the main building were sheets of flame and the work of fighting the fire was made more difficult by the tar in the roofing, which melted and dripped. Mr. Geisendorfer had his hands painfully burned by the tar. When the fire broke out the Dispatch was just leaving the Prosper dock and consequently had her fire fighting apparatus ready when she reached the mill. The mill is the property of C. McC. Johnson, who was in San Francisco at the time of the fire. Insurance covers the entire loss, John Neilson being the local agent for the company with whom the policy is carried.
