The Civil Service Reform fever is of a malignant type among Federal office-holders.

In the Forty-ninth Congress the Democrats have a majority in the House of 43, while Republicans will control the Senate by 8 votes.

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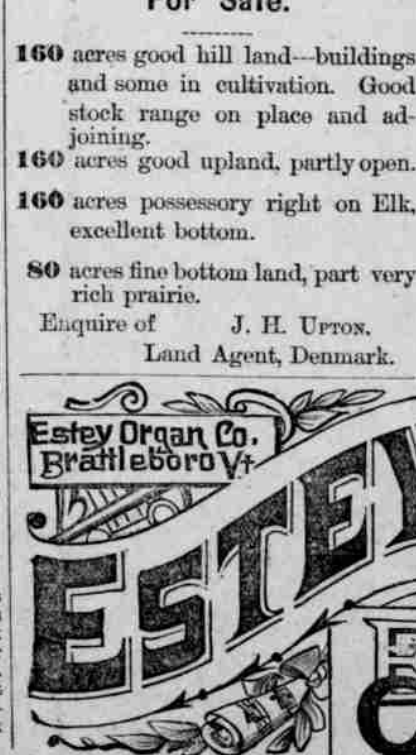
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
