The Columbus board of trade esti mates that the Hocking Valley strike has cost it and the coal companies \$1,620,000. The loss to Columbus business men, outside of the board, is said to be \$350,000, to the railroads centering at Columbus, \$1.100,000, to the furnaces in Hocking Valley \$220. 000, and to the city of Columbus \$3,-500,000.
