HOUSEHOLD CORNER

For Different Anniversaries

Here are the wedding anniversaries: The silver wedding is usually celebrated in some way or other, and so is the golden wedding anniversary, by those who are fortunate enough to have one to celebrate. But the many anniversaries that come before these famous ones are very often left uncelebrated, save, perhaps, by a dinner, or perhaps a theatre party. The old-fashioned characters of the different days are not taken into consideration.

The first anniversary is the one dedicated to cotton. A cotton party might be given, to which all guests were invited to come, dressed in cotton. The rooms should be decorated with cotton bolts and "cotton" refreshments should be served—any delicacies suggestive of the cotton-growing belt. For a cotton luncheon the refreshments might be cream rice soup, fried chicken, hominy cakes, stuffed sweet potatoes, small squares of hot corn bread, stuffed tomato salad, cotton balls (balls of vanilla ice cream) and coffee.

The second anniversary is the paper anniversary, and in these days of the perfection of crepe paper for decoration purposes no clever woman need be at a loss for effective paper decorations. Paper flowers, candle shades, paper tablecloth, napkins and dishes might all be used at a paper supper. And the cooked food might be prepared in paper bags. Of course there should be paper place cards, and ice cream could be served in paper cases, the bonbons wrapped in paper and the sandwiches tied with paper ribbon.

A good menu for a paper-bag supper would be: Grape fruit and oranges served in glass cups, wrapped in tissue paper, tied with a ribbon around the top (the guests open these themselves); then creamed salmon in paper cases, lamb chops, peas and hashed potatoes, rolled sandwiches tied with paper ribbon, pepper and cucumber salad served on paper plates, biscuit tottoni in paper cups, cakes and coffee. The coffee will have to be served in china cups. Everything else can be served in the paper utensils, and all the cooked

dishes can be prepared in paper bags in the oven. The creamed salmon, cooked in a bag, can be dished in paper cases.

One might plan a third anniversary party for some friend and ask all the guests bidden to observe its significance. The third anniversary is the leather one, and the gifts brought might include leather-bound books, leather belts, purses, handbags, key cases and the many little traveling conveniences of leather—cases for sewing materials, drinking cups, scissors, bodkins and many other things.

The wooden anniversary might be celebrated with a feast of picnic nature served on wooden trays—including sandwiches and cold dishes served on wooden plates, a salad mixed with wooden fork and spoon in a wooden bowl, a cake on a wooden cake board and nuts from a wooden nut bowl. Little carved wooden paper knives, nut crackers and other knickknacks would make appropriate favors.

An Excellent Recipe

Brown sugar cookies—Cream two-thirds of a cup of butter, or butter and lard mixed, with one and one-half cups of brown sugar, add two well beaten eggs and mix thoroughly, then stir in three rounded cups of flour, sifted with one teaspoonful of soda, two teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar and a pinch of salt; flavor with a teaspoonful of vanilla, roll thin, cut with a cookie-cutter, and bake in a brisk oven.

tains. Several thousand acres will be surveyed and mapped intensively, and a detailed cruise made of the timber resources of the region.
