OREGON PIONEER VISITING RELATIVES IN BANDON

Was First White Child Born in the State; Was Through the Hardships of Early Days.

Mrs. Sallie Miller of Salem, Oregon mother of Mrs. H. Helmsken of this city, arrived the latter part of the week for a visit with her daughter and grand children.

Mrs. Miller, who is in the seventies, made the trip alone, coming by way of Roseburg. She is one of the pioneers of the state and has the honor of being known as the first white child born in Oregon. Her parents came to the territory in an emigrant train from the east. They settled near the Columbia river, where Mrs. Miller was born. It is said another pure white child was born a short while before, but only lived a short time. Her father was active in the early political history of the state, having been one of the 191 settlers who voted at Campoc on the question as to whether Oregon was to be a part of the United States or Canada. His name is the fourth on the monument erected in honor of the pioneers who saved the state to the Union.

She was the second native-born Oregonian to be married and her husband was active in the Indian wars of the Rogue river country in the early days. She will remain in Bandon during the winter.

S. A. Carmichael was taken from the Mercy hospital at North Bend, Tuesday, where he was operated upon four weeks ago for appendicitis. Mrs. Carmichael went over to the Bay the same day to be with her husband and will accompany him back to Bandon as soon as the doctors are of the opinion he will be well enough to stand the journey.
