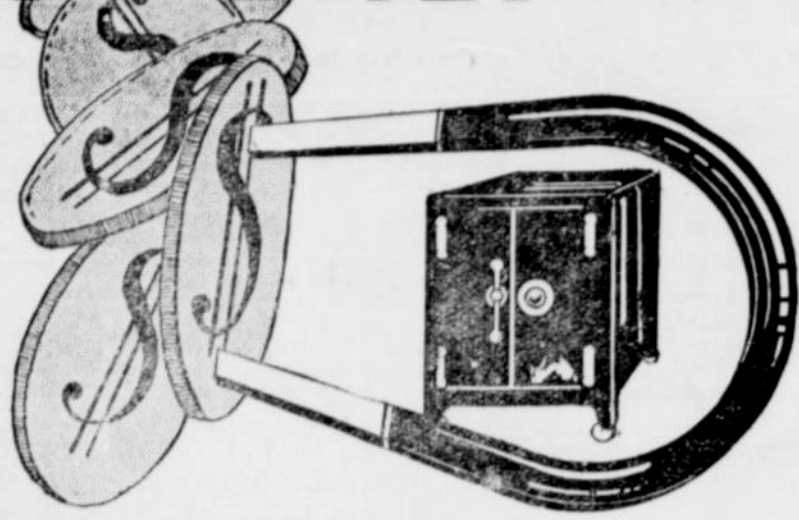

## Russian-Finn Breaks Loose---Is Bad Actor

Would Fight Any Man in Town But Becomes Docile at Sight of Officer.

With shouts of "murder," "police" interspersed by groans and yells, which sounded much as if a ghastly murder was being committed, John Rumbell, a big burly Russian-Finn fisherman, caused unusual excitement at the Parks & Bottom restaurant Monday afternoon.

Rumbell, who is in the employ of Sam Nass, apparently had received his pay check earlier in the day and was hilariously intoxicated when he entered the restaurant and ordered a meal. Having eaten what was placed before him, he positively refused to pay for it, giving no specific reasons except that he was broke. The waiter sent him to the kitchen to interview Boss "Pat" Bottom. Cursing the waiter, the place and everyone in it, he proceeded to the kitchen where he politely told Mr. Bottom to "go to h---l." The genial proprietor tried to argue with the unruly customer, but instead of listening to reason Rumbell "took a punch at him." He only took one, however, for Pat was pretty much "riled up" by that time. He gave the aggressor a little of his own medicine and concluded by ejecting him bodily out of the back door.

Lying flat on his back between the restaurant and the Grand theatre, the burly fisherman yelled bloody murder until everyone for blocks around was attracted to the scene. He was picked up and escorted to the walk but refused to be tamed. Throwing his hat and coat on the sidewalk he challenged any man in the crowd to a fight, using the most vile language in his abuse of the populace in general. No one cared to tackle him until Deputy Marshall Colgrove arrived on the scene. He showed Rumbell his star, and instantly all the rage left the big fellow and he walked along like a good dog to the city jail.

Tuesday morning Judge Kausrud fined him \$5 for disorderly conduct.

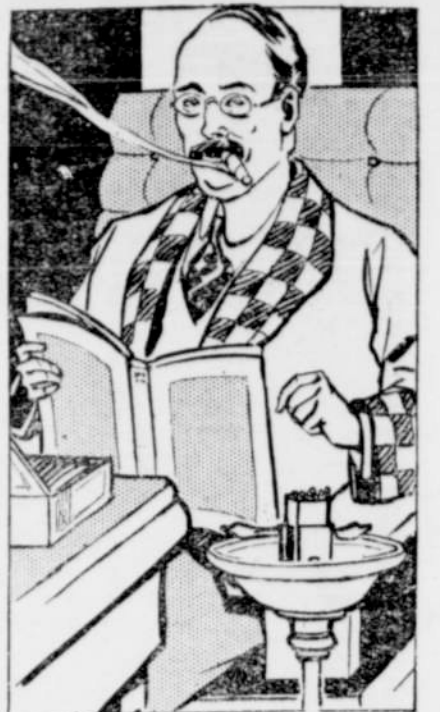

The new station is to be built by the government at Coaledo, a few miles up the bay from Marshfield, and will be made to develop about three times the power that the present one will.
