The play has been staged with the greatest accuracy to historical detail, and the producers have been untiring in their efforts to secure beautiful, and at the same time realistic effects. Some remarkable pictures have been made of the California missions, particularly of the old San Fernando mission; and to complete the artistic setting of this story permission was obtained to photograph some very fine interiors. There were Mexicans in full uniform of generals and subalterns, vaqueros, cow boys, civilian soldiers, Indians, painted and feathered, and pioneers of every variety, and beautiful thoroughbred horses with their glistening trappings. The company leased a vast ranch for this picture, one of the most beautiful locations in the mountains. A great stage seventy-five by ninety was constructed as a reproduction of an early California mission. All southern California was scoured to secure altar pieces, rederos, painting, etc., to add to the realism of the picture.

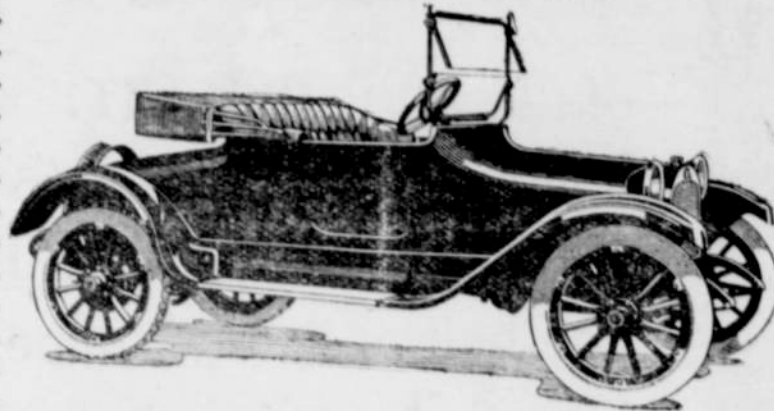
Breakwater on the Run
