OLD LANDMARK COLLAPSES

First "City Jail" Falls Before the Wind and Shaking of Tide.
A small building, or more properly an old shed on the E. N. Smith property opposite the Gatchell barn on Edison avenue collapsed the other night, partly obstructing the sidewalk.
Small as it was, the old shed has a history. According to some of the older residents it was at one time Bandon's town jail, being used for that purpose before the building just west of the city hall, now used as a dog pound, was constructed for that purpose. In the heyday of the shed, when its shingled sides gave an added dignity, Edison avenue was not yet improved. The old county road, a portion of which is still used along the Oregon avenue hill, wound down through the business section past the shed, across the gulch and out Ocean Drive way. At that time the larger buildings adjoining were the home of a popular livery and feed stable, the delapidated sign of which may still be seen from the east side.

Photographs Had Been Shipped Parcels Post

Letter From Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wolverton Solves Mystery—Package Riffled.
A letter from Miss Sarah T. Wolverton of Palo Alto, Cal., to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Wolverton of this city, received this week, clears up the mystery surrounding the finding of photographs of the latter among the wreckage of the Santa Clara.
The pictures had been sent via parcels post by Miss Wolverton to her brother, E. T. Wolverton, Jr., who was at that time visiting his parents here. Mr. Wolverton enroute west from Dexter, Maine, had visited his sister before coming here. He had shown her the photographs of his parents together with one each of his two cousins. She asked to keep them for a few days in order to show some friends, promising to forward them by parcels post, which she did. They were on the Santa Clara, but not found until after the young man had left here, consequently their presence could not be explained.
Evidently the photos were in one of the mail sacks riffled by the pillagers and had been discarded after the package was torn open.
