UNIVERSITY OF OREGON SOUND AND VIGOROUS

So Says U. S. Specialist in Higher Education After Exhaustive Investigation.

After an exhaustive investigation of the University of Oregon by S. P. Capen, specialist in higher education in the U. S. Bureau of Education, says:

"In conclusion, the investigator would like to emphasize his appreciation of the general soundness and vigor of the institution. Its faculty as a whole is alert and capable; the students clean, intelligent, and for the most part, well prepared. The spirit of the institution, as it has been observed during the ten days following registration, is excellent.

"The University of Oregon is one of the State's most important instruments for the production of a more intelligent and efficient democracy. The state may well take pride in its university. It should cherish it and above all be loyal to it. Oregon is evidently one of the eve of a large development. Its vast resources have hardly been scratched. With the filling up of the Northwest, its population and wealth are bound to increase. The future of a state university already well established, with foundations well laid, is in such a state usually full of promise.

The consumption of sugar per capita in the United States is estimated to be more than ten times what it was a hundred years ago. During the past five years, the consumption has averaged about 83 pounds per capita. A hundred years ago the consumption of sugar widely varied; it was usually, however, between 4 and 10 pounds a year. Great Britain consumed 92 pounds per capita more than the United States in 1911, but France and Germany used far less, the per capita consumption being 39 and 42 pounds, respectively.

Ammunition for the fight against tuberculosis in Oregon has been received by the Oregon Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, and a call is sent out for additional recruits to handle the Red cross seals. One million bright little stickers are now awaiting distribution by volunteers, who are willing to devote a little time and effort to the sale so that the anti-tuberculosis work in this state may be carried a step further during the coming year.
