School District Bond Election Notice

A LONDON NEWSPAPER

The English Have an Entirely Different Method of News-Handling

The following from the Ashland, (Oregon) Tidings is of interest:

We are in receipt of the London (England) Observer. This paper is one of the great London newspapers and it is so different from American newspapers we wish we could send a copy to all of our subscribers. The first page of the paper is taken up entirely with small advertisements. The first news article in the paper is a two or three column review of the financial situation, then follows columns devoted to markets. The next page is devoted entirely to a list of men and officers killed and wounded in battle. The fourth page is devoted to book reviews and the fifth page to letters to the editor. The sixth page, in this social center of the world, has a column and a half of society news and then some special reference to the doings of notables. The seventh page is given over to dramatical news and then comes the editorial page. The first news item, as Americans regard news, is printed on the ninth page, and this is about the war. In fact, all of the ninth page, all of the tenth page and nearly all of the eleventh page is devoted to war news. On the eleventh page there is a half-column story about a London street railway strike and some ten or twelve small items of city affairs from three to six inches long. The twelfth and thirteenth pages are given over to war news. The fourteenth page to art and music and paid church announcements. The fifteenth and sixteenth pages carry special articles. The seventeenth page prints athletics—not "sports" as we understand that term in America—and the back page is devoted to small classified advertisements. This completes the copy of the London Sunday Observer. Aside from the war news there is scarcely an article in the paper which would not be as interesting one day as another. The largest advertisement in the paper is that of a real estate firm, taking half a page. The great bulk of the advertising is small ten and fifteen inch ads, largely dealing with dry goods and other things ladies buy. The only pictures appearing in the paper outside of illustrations in advertising are three pertaining to the war.

OREGON WOMEN'S FEET SAID TO BE SUPERIOR

Have Inferior Teeth and Are Also Smaller in Stature. Says Eastern Authority.

Oregon women have better feet, but inferior teeth and are more slightly built than the women of Illinois, says Miss Mabel Cummings, physical director of women at the University of Oregon. She draws her conclusions from her physical examination of 140 University women, and her 12 years at the Illinois state university.

"People here are more homogenous than they are in the middle west. They are further developed in our nervous, dynamic American life than in my state," said Miss Cummings. "The girls have infinitely better feet, which condition is due largely to the more sensible type of shoes worn by the women of the west. In the matter of teeth they are inferior, although they show no signs of

dental neglect. This condition is due to a number of causes, the soft water, which furnishes no lime for the teeth, the predominance of soft foods in their more lightly developed physiques. It is hard to differentiate between the girls of the two sections in matter of posture and carriage. At any rate, the women here do not surpass those farther east in this respect. I find my work among the girls here very interesting. They are well bred, pleasant, good natured, nicely mannered and dress more sensibly than those among whom I have been accustomed to work."
