Paul Stephan Has a Clean Establishment

Seaside Bakery Is Now One of the High Class Shops of State.

A representative of Western World who happened to "browse" through the baking department of the new Paul Stephan bakery building was impressed with the modern methods and cleanliness apparent everywhere.

The oven is one of the latest models, Petersen make, with a capacity of 300 loaves of bread every 40 minutes and this time can be shortened to a considerable extent if desired, by increasing the heat. No more the old, old, laborious method of building a fire in the oven, then scraping the coals when it was "guessed" the heat was strong enough. The new oven is heated by a furnace and not a single bit of smoke or fumes can enter the baking cavity. On the front of the same is a thermometer showing at all times the exact heat and an electric light makes it possible to see every corner. An arrangement is also had to allow steam to be turned into the oven at the proper moment, thus giving the bread that crisp and appetizing appearance noted of late.

At the time Mr. and Mrs. Stephan were busily engaged in cooking a large bunch of delicious ginger cookies, and only 5 minutes elapsed between the time they were put in the oven and when they came out ready to eat. Several were sampled and it is not apparent to the eater, at least, how anyone could find a fault with them.

Mr. Stephan states that the various steamships making the local port are accustomed to obtain supplies of the local product, and several of them have increased their orders materially, giving as their reason the statement the Bandon bread was much better than the bread obtained in San Francisco. He also states that using his new oven, he finds he now supplies fresh bread practically all of the time, his staled bread, which by the way isn't very old, being several hours fresher than the stale bread handled on the Bay.

Mr. and Mrs. Stephan came to Bandon from Coquille some three or more years ago. Since their advent Bandon has had a steady bread supply, but previous to that period, several parties who entered the bakery business here, failed to make a go of it.

Oregon Voter Says Roseburg-Coos County Road is State Problem.

MILL GETS BIG CEDAR JOB

Marshfield Plant to Supply 2,000,000 Feet to San Francisco.

Marshfield, Jan. 3.—The C. A. Smith mill has an order for 2,000,000 feet of the best grade of white cedar lumber for San Francisco delivery.

It will take nearly a year to supply it, as the timber must be chosen from the best that is manufactured. It is said to be the largest order for white cedar ever given in the county.

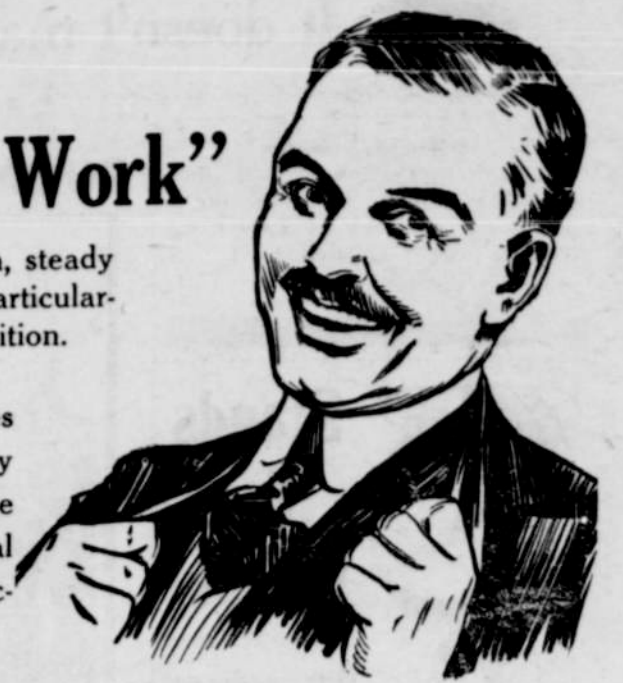

ACKNOWLEDGED THE DEED Man Detained for Bad Action in Connection With Check Confessed.
