AVOIDING COLDS

During the past few weeks colds, la grippe or influenza, whatever we choose to call it, has carried hundreds of souls into the other world, which might have been longer for this earth. There has been an epidemic throughout the entire country, and, because of the fact that influenza has never been considered seriously infectious, health officials have been without the machinery to stop it. Colds are infectious and it is generally conceded that they are of bacterial origin. At present a serum is being manufactured which according to one Bandon physician has proven very effective and is almost a positive preventative for at least a year.

However we should learn how to prevent colds in the natural way. Here are some of the essentials. Colds frequently result where there is a deformed or diseased nose or throat, or where there are adenoids. Frequently the bacteria gets a better and easier hold there than in the case of people with good noses and throats.

Living and sleeping in the fresh air increases one's resistance against colds. Taking a cold sponge bath about the neck, arms and shoulders each morning also helps immensely. Constipation is frequently an indirect cause of colds and should be strenuously guarded against. Over eating, over heating, especially dry steam or stove heat in winter, and under exercising are potent causes of colds.

Last of all, one should avoid close association with other people having colds, coughs or "grippe," or those who cough or sneeze without holding a handkerchief before their faces. Keep a good bunch of fresh air between yourself and the cold victim and you will be much safer.

THE RALEGA HIGHWAY

If some of the military programs suggested by certain eastern politicians were carried out the United States would have the German system outlasted in less than ten years. Just why we should be prepared to lick the whole world has not yet been explained and would probably require an expose of some of the more intimate relationships between certain military fanatics and the munition manufacturers.

At the present time munition plants are operating night and day for foreign trade and naturally their activity has stimulated business in the localities wherein they are located. But the present war might stop at any time, therefore in order to keep things moving it would be a fine thing for the owners of these plants and the communities in which they are located to keep them busy a few years longer making war stuff for Uncle Sam, regardless of what Uncle Sam might need.

Undoubtedly the United States needs some additional measures of protection, and the first of these is adequate coast defense. This is impossible without a good coast road, especially along the Pacific. Elsewhere in this issue an article by F. W. Harris of Renton, Wash., explains the Balboa Highway, a proposed Pacific coast military highway, which will come up before Congress at its present session, and which

should receive the united support of the Pacific coast states.

Such an improvement would not only be of value in time of war, but in time of peace would be a great factor in developing the coast section thereby adding vast wealth and population to the country. The road would be of especial benefit to Coos and Curry counties as it would cross both from north to south, passing through Marshfield and Bandon and all the Curry county towns.

Will Remain in Office Under Bank Hall, Next to Western World.

Will remain in office under Bank hall, next to Western World, Bandon, all day Wednesdays and Saturdays of each week. Other days of the week will be in the office part of the time, and Saturday nights until 9 o'clock, in order to give all a chance to register.

All foreigners must show their final naturalization papers or their father's final papers. All American girls married to foreign men must register under their husband's naturalization papers. All Bandon residents must give their street and house numbers. All country residents must give the section, township and range in which they live.
