Sentiment Is Against the Occupation Tax

Will Bandon have an occupation tax after July 1?

That is a question which is arousing an under current of opposition among the business men of the city, who for the past six months have been meeting the deficit of the city treasury by direct contribution.

At the time the occupation tax was passed the understanding of the business men's committee drafting the schedule and others was that the measure was to be in force for six months, or until such time as the proposed 15 mill tax limit measure could be voted upon by the citizens. In the meantime the business men have assumed the extra burden cheerfully and have paid the tax promptly.

But if opposition to the 15 mill tax limit should down that proposed charter amendment at the coming election the business men, or at least 20 of them it is said, will refuse to pay the occupation tax any longer, claiming it is unfair for the city as a whole to require the business establishments to meet the general obligations except in emergencies.

Brooklyn Bucks Northwest
Kilham Goes to Her Assistance and She Just Makes Port in Time.

The steamer Brooklyn arrived from the south about 5:30 Monday evening. She was coming up the coast about 10 miles south of the bar, bucking a strong northwest gale, when Capt. John Johnson of the tug Kilham noticed that she could not make it in time for the tide, it already being almost high water. He put out to her assistance getting a hawser aboard about eight miles south of the bar. It took an hour and a half for the two to make that distance but they arrived about two hours after high water and were able to make port without trouble. Without the assistance of the tug the Brooklyn would have been forced to remain outside for twelve hours more.

Phoenix Gets a Cargo
The Phoenix left port Sunday evening with a cargo of lumber from the Moore mill. She arrived here after the longshoremen's strike went into effect and although the company agreed to pay the advance the local members of the union could not load her. The boat owners finally received orders from the union headquarters at San Francisco to let the mill hands and sailors load the ship, but not to allow any non-union man aboard. It is probable that the ship will remain unloaded at San Francisco until the strike is settled.

Buys Auto Stage Line

C. L. Foster of the Bandon Garage has purchased the auto stage line between Bandon and Bullard's ferry, for several years conducted by Jerry VanDeventer. He is overhauling the old cars used and in the meantime has placed his own cars on the run. His brother, Jess, is acting as driver. Jerry has gone to Marshfield where it is reported he will be employed as a jitney driver.
