STRONG WINS HIS CASE

L. F. Slavens Is Fined for Striking Two Mile Cheesemaker.

The case of L. M. Strong vs. L. F. Slavens, both Two Mile residents, which was heard in Justice C. R. Wade's court Thursday afternoon resulted in a verdict against the latter who had been charged with assault and battery. He was fined \$5 and costs, the costs amounting to a little over \$30. The jury was out about 15 minutes.

According to the testimony presented the two men had a dispute over wood which Slavens was to have delivered to the Farmers Manufacturing & Supply Co.'s cheese factory, of which Strong is manager. In order to reach an understanding Strong, together with two witnesses, went to the Slavens home. During a discussion which became quite spirited the latter is said to have struck his opponent. The two then completed their argument and Strong went home, later coming to Bandon to swear out a warrant.

Slavens stated in court that he struck Strong only after the latter had crowded him toward a nearby ditch. This was denied by Strong and his witnesses, the latter declaring that they had not seen any ditch at the place.

21,000,000 "Soldiers" in U. S.

Washington, July 10—The census bureau, while unable to answer specifically the question how many able bodied citizens of military age there are in the United States, estimates that the total number of male citizens and those who have declared their intention to become citizens, who are 18 to 45 years old inclusive, is not far from 21,000,000.

Eight Measures To Be On The Ballot

Three Proposed Questions for Voters to Settle Not Filed With Secretary of State.

Salem, July 6—Eight state-wide measures bearing a total of 227,328 signatures, five proposed county laws, and three measures submitted by the last legislature, will be on the official ballot next November at the general election, it was assured tonight when the time for filing petitions expired.

Three proposed statewide measures for which petitions were in circulation, apparently failed to obtain the necessary number of signatures, for their sponsors failed to file them with Secretary of State Olcott today. The proposed measures which are thus automatically eliminated from consideration are: One day of rest in seven law, advocated by the Weekly Rest Day league of Portland; a measure to protect salmon in Columbia river and tributaries by prohibiting fishing with seines, traps or fish wheels, initiated by the Clackamas County Fishermen's Union, and a proposed law regulating the admission to the practice of professions relating to the public health, initiated by Vitus A. Fitzgerald of Portland.

Beer Law Favored

Of the statewide measures which will appear on the ballot, the constitutional amendment advocated by the "equal rights for home industry" committee proposing to allow manufacturing of light beer in Oregon, leads in the number of signatures, with a total of 42,046. This is the largest ever filed with the secretary of state and contains 7294 more names than the "dry" petition filed two years ago. C. T. Haas of Portland filed the completed petition. He stated slightly more than half of the names were obtained outside of Multnomah county and that approximately one-third of the signers were women.

The proposed constitutional amendment to prohibit the importation of liquor into the state for beverage purposes was filed today by J. Sanger Fox in behalf of the Oregon Prohibition state committee. It bore 30,479 names, ranking second in number of signatures carried.

Other statewide measures for which petitions were filed with the number of signatures are: People's land and loan law amendment, 24,653 signatures; providing normal for Pendleton amendment, 28,000; statewide tax limitation amendment, 25,283; rural credits amendment, 27,259 signatures; prohibition of compulsory vaccination and medical treatment law, 25,126; law to repeal and abolish the Sunday closing law, 24,506 signatures. Statewide measures referred by the last legislature are: Single item veto amendment; exemption of ships amendment, and amendment repealing constitutional provision forbidding suffrage to negroes, Chinamen and mulattoes.

MYRTLE POINT WOMAN KILLED BY AUTOMOBILE
Mrs. Flossie Dye Run Down by Chris Mohler's Car and Body Dragged 30 Feet—Was Walking.

Chris Mohler of Myrtle Point, accompanied by his father-in-law, N. P. Peterson, while driving an automobile late Sunday afternoon, struck Mrs. Flossie Dye, the auto knocking the woman down and dragging her about 30 feet. The accident occurred at the edge of town on the county road out of Myrtle Point near the McCullen place. Mohler at once took the woman to Dr. Pemberton's office at Myrtle Point where she died about an hour later.

She was about 22 years old and a cousin of Al Kennedy. Mrs. Kennedy was with her at the time of the accident, wheeling a baby buggy. Mohler is associated with N. P. Peterson in the mercantile business in Myrtle Point.

Portland Business Men To Visit Here

Commercial Trip Planned to Coos County During September to Get Acquainted.

Dates for the Portland business men's trip to Coos county and surrounding territory have been fixed, tentatively, for the week of September 11. It is planned to leave there on Monday of that week and remain on the tour until Saturday.

The trip will be the first of the kind following completion of the Southern Pacific's new line into Coos county. The program calls for a visit not only to the cities of Coos Bay, but also to those of the Coquille valley, the Siuslaw and lower Umpqua.

The chamber of commerce of Portland also will send a delegation to Coos county for the formal celebrations attending the completion of the railroad late in August, but that trip will be purely social in its nature. The September trip will be commercial as well as social.

WAS RIDING THE HORSE

Animal Became Unmanageable and Rider Jumped Off.

Joe Flam, who was severely injured about the face on the Fourth, when he was struck by a horse, has been able to enjoy the open air the past week. He says that he was riding the horse and guiding it with a halter rope. The animal started off on a full gallop, and being unable to hold it, he decided to jump just before he came to a dangerous place, where he thought the horse might fall.

In jumping, he fell in front of the animal and the latter struck him a hard blow in the face with a front foot. The bones of the nose and cheek were shattered and almost the entire half of his face was torn open. It required many stitches to sew up the wound and he will probably have a large permanent scar. The left eye was also injured.

SUBMARINE FROM GERMANY

Big Undersea Merchant Vessel Arrives With Dyestuffs.

Baltimore, July 9—The world's first submarine merchant vessel, the German underwater liner, Deutschland, anchored below Baltimore tonight after voyaging safely across the Atlantic, passing the allied blockading squadrons and eluding enemy cruisers watching for her off the American coast.

She carried a message from Emperor William to President Wilson, a quantity of mail, estimated at 750 tons and a cargo of 750 tons of costly chemicals and dyestuffs. It will carry back to Germany a similar tonnage of nickel and crude rubber, sorely needed by the German army. It took 16 days to make the trip.

Rainier and during their stay in Seattle, spent most of their time touring around on the splendid King county highways. Mr. and Mrs. Rogers are expected home within a few days.

To Extend the Taxes

Assessor T. J. Thrift has received formal notice from the state tax commission advising him that the lands of the O. & C. land grant are not subject to taxation. Of course if the law recently enacted by Congress is upheld, the railroad will have only a \$2.50 an acre equity in these lands, but as Mr. Thrift is somewhat uncertain as to what the courts may say about these lands in the future, and as he has already assessed them for the year 1916, he has been in doubt whether to extend the taxes against them or not. On consulting the county court about the matter, he has been advised that there is nothing to lose and there may be something to gain by putting these lands on the tax rolls, and he will probably do so. There are 121,045 acres of these O. & C. lands in Coos county. They have heretofore been assessed for \$1,840,591, and the taxes on them amount to about \$50,000 a year.—Coquille Sentinel.

Harry Wheeler of Gearhart was drowned while swimming in the surf at Seaside. This is the second victim at that resort this season.

To Raise Much Money

Eight thousand dollars is the sum expected to be raised in North Bend and Marshfield for the Coos Bay Railroad Jubilee, August 24, 25, 26. Of this amount \$3,000 is slated to come from North Bend and \$5,000 from Marshfield. Such was the report of Tom T. Bennett, chairman of the Marshfield committee, made before the chamber of commerce of that place.

Coos Man Gets Job

The Douglas county court awarded the contract for improving the so-called Camas valley road to E. E. Weekly of Coos county. Mr. Weekly's bid was in the sum of \$6,285. The contract provides for the grading and planing of a point about a half mile west of the Camas valley store and extending into what is known as the canyon.
