### FIVE GAME WARDENS IN SOUTHERN COOS AND CURRY

Thomas Says Hunting Will Be Better Later in Season—Gives Six Reminders to Hunters.

Game Warden J. M. Thomas, who was here last week enroute to his home at North Bend, after a visit in this section of the county, stated that does and fawns are very numerous but the big bucks are keeping in the brush. He thinks that deer hunting will be better early in September than when the season opens August 15th. He has secured five additional deputies to aid him in this territory. One has already gone to the Elk peak section and the others will go to different vicinities next week.

Mr. Thomas says that there are six things for deer hunters to remember and he lists them as follows:

- First, get your license.
  - Second, be careful what you shoot at.
  - Third, tag your deer immediately.
  - Fourth, keep the proof of the identity of the deer.
  - Fifth, don't shoot does or fawns.
  - Sixth, leave the dogs at home.
- He says that the game wardens hope that it will not be necessary to prosecute anyone and they ask the co-operation of the hunters in seeing that the law is complied with.

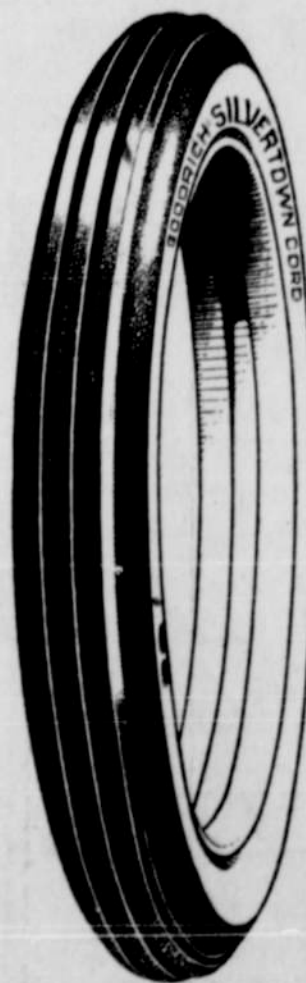
