San Francisco she carried 1231 tons of general merchandise, including goods shipped from Southern California. No part of this, officials of the company declare, was particularly inflammable or in any way combustible.

In the vessel's fuel tanks however, were 5000 barrels of oil.

The steamer had five decks. On the bridge deck were the officers quarters and chart room. On the deck just below were the wireless operators' rooms, smoking rooms, children's playroom and dancing room. Then came the promenade deck, a social hall and extra fare rooms. The next deck contained staterooms, lobby, writing room and bridal suites. Below this was the saloon deck and dining rooms.

The Congress had had an uneventful career on this coast. On June 16 last when the Bear was wrecked on Blunt's reef, the Congress was swept out of her compass course and approached Seal rocks near San Francisco. The breakers were discovered in time and the steamer was backed out of danger.

Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Croft, who have a summer home near Langlois, were in Port Orford Sunday returning from a visit to the southern end of the county. Mr. Croft is an ardent fisherman, and nearly every summer finds him trolling for salmon on Rogue river. He reports the sport on the river this year, however, as below par, and says that very few salmon are being caught with the hook. 4 cups Sperry Flour, 1 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon soda, ½ cup molasses, 2 eggs, 1 cup milk, ¼ cup of oil butter.
Mix dry ingredients and add molasses, milk, eggs and melted butter. Beat smooth and bake in a sheet for about one hour. (12)
