Holiday excursions are cared for with ticket sales on December 21 to 23 and December 25 to 28, good until January 15 with stop over privileges. The round trip fare is one way rate plus one-third and rates may be had to all point in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California.

The eastern buyers of steelhead salmon have now entered the Coquille field and yesterday shipped the first carload of fresh fish from Coquille city. Several carloads have been shipped from the Umpqua river section, where an incipient fish war between two companies raised the price paid to 12 1-2 cents for a few days. This was apparently too good to last however, for the price is now said to be 8 cents per pound—still a handsome margin above the usual figure.

The basket ball game Thursday night between Bandon High school and Oerding Brothers' teams was quite good and gave a good insight into the class of ball the local basket shooters may be depended upon to develop when they get lined up on their run for county honors this year. Both teams showed lack of practice but the local boys put up a good swift game and demonstrated that with more practice they are certain to make a record. The score was 34 to 42 in favor of the Coquille lads.
