Speedy Little Gas Boat Owned by Dr. Mann "Put in Commission" by L. L. Jackson.

It was the launching of the little gas boat owned by Dr. S. J. Mann which took place with due pomp and ceremony at 9:00 o'clock this morning. COAST GUARD MAN IS HERO IN H-3 WRECK

The remark is frequently heard that the boys of the Coast Guard service certainly have a snap. Their job might be considered a snap because it is not often that they have real service to do. But, when duty does call, they invariably demonstrate that the job is not all pleasure and that they are "there with the goods." The following news dispatch in connection with the submarine accident the other day, appeared in the Oregonian:

"To the heroism of surfman Oscar Swanson, of the Humbolt Coast Guard station, the twenty-three men from the H-2 probably owe their lives. Carried to the side of the submarine in a surfboat, Swanson leaped to the seawashed decks of the H-2 and finally made fast a line, after two attempts by the exhausted crew of the submarine had failed."

"While more than 2000 persons stood along the shore in breathless silence, Swanson took the first line which had been shot aboard the submarine early in the day and made it fast, but it parted.

"A second line fell true across the hull near the conning tower. On reaching for the line Swanson lost his grip and a sea washed him overboard. But the husky viking, a giant in strength and courage, was not daunted. Soon he was back aboard the submarine, and, while the crowd ashore cheered, he clung to the slippery deck and made fast the line. Soon the breeches buoy was rigged and the work of rescue was begun. Every four minutes a man was landed, until at 6:15 the last man, Lieutenant Bogusch himself was landed."
