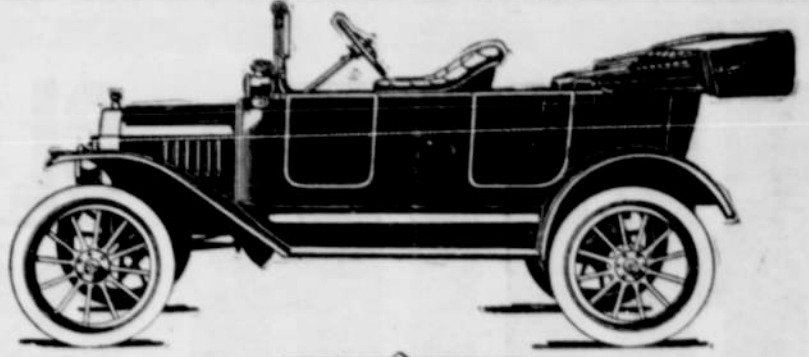
LIBRARIAN'S REPORT
