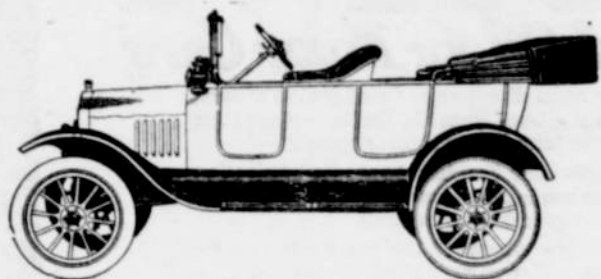

Is \$50 too much to pay for a three months old pig? It is not if you are going to do constructive breeding. That is the price I am paying for a herd leader, but here is what is back of him: His sire (Big Four), was first under six months boar 1915, Kansas State Fair, Kansas State Show and American Royal; first junior yearling boar 1914 Spokane Interstate and Oregon State Fairs, and Grand Champion boar 1916 Oregon State Fair. Sire of first get of sire and junior champion sow 1915, Oregon State Fair. And the mother of this \$50 pig (Sibiria Duchess XV.) was first under year sow 1914 Spokane Interstate, Washington and Oregon State Fairs, junior and reserve of Washington and grand champion of Oregon, member of first pride under year herd and under year herd bred by exhibitor and first get of sire at Spokane and under year herd at Oregon; dam of Dominator, the highest priced (\$250) four-months-old pig ever sold in the west and who was first prize junior yearling boar 1916 Spokane and Sioux City Interstate, Missouri State Fair, the Cascade International, and grand champion at the Northwest Live Stock show.

The question is, do these show records mean any thing to the average farmer who only keeps a few hogs? And am I unreasonable with the average farmer when I ask him fifteen to twenty-five dollars for weanling pigs from such stock as I have just described? Before you decide on these questions let it be understood that the hog that takes a first prize at a modern show does not take it in its fancy coat of hair or on the color of its eyes. But it wins for having attained the greatest weight in the shortest time, for having the best haws, the best shoulders, the best loins and for its vigor. Let it also be remembered that a good line-bred boar adds \$10 to the value of every litter over that of the scrub, and this is true even if mated with scrub sows.
