PORT ORFORD NEWS

Miss Gladys Jamieson, daughter of C. A. Jamieson of the Hotel Bandon, is spending a few days visiting relatives at Port Orford.

N. C. and Geo. Dibelbis were in town from Elk river Saturday attending to business matters. The latter is recovering from the infection that followed a woodtick bite a month or so ago, although he is not yet as robust as he was before. The poison from the insect entered his system so that his limbs swelled until the skin broke in a number of places.

Haying is in full swing throughout this end of the county. The crop is light, and if rain does not come very soon grain hay that is coming on will not make much more than half a crop. The late spring, followed by the present dry spell is affecting the fruit crop. Cherries in many places have dried on the trees, and the rest of the orchard crop does not look encouraging. Strawberries on hill ground have dried up with less than half a crop.

T. C. Clark, who was in town over Sunday from the mines at Cape Blanco, says that the beach miners there are worrying about the fuel oil that has been discharged from the stranded Sinaloa and is mixing with the sands. It is almost impossible to amalgamate greasy gold, and while the miners are now working back on the beach where they have to strip to the pay sand, yet it is feared that next winter considerable difficulty will be experienced in getting the values out of the sand.
