The Woman's Committee of the Dregon Council of Defense, through its chairman, Mrs. Charles H. Castner of Hood River, has designated Saturday, September 15th as official registration day for the women of this state.

This registration is wholly voluntary and is for the purpose of the federal government becoming familiar with the women power of the state-listing all girls and women, both trained and untrained, for work in the government service in some capacity, should it be found necessary for the nation to call upon the women of the country to take the places of men in industry in order that men may be released to join the colors. It is also essential so that trained female help may be secured for government positions and positions directly connected with military affairs that can be filled by women

KEEP OUT OF WOODS: SOLDIERS MIGHT SHOOT




